Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas received US Consul General in Jerusalem Michael Ratney in Ramallah. They discussed the outcomes of President Barack Obama's recent visit to Palestine and the region. (WAFA)

After meeting with US Consul General Michael Ratney and other foreign delegations in Jerusalem, Saeb Erakat, Executive Committee member of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO), in a statement, said that the Israeli occupation, settlement activities and attempts to impose facts on the ground, particularly in East Jerusalem, were the real danger that threatened security, stability and peace in the region. In Cairo, Hamas leaders re-elected Khaled Mashaal as Political Bureau Chief for the fourth time. Sources said that the mandate of Mr. Mashaal was likely to be renewed despite his announcement that he would not be running. Ismail Haniyeh was elected as one of the three deputy heads of the Political Bureau. (Ma'an News Agency, Egypt Independent)

A Palestinian farmer sustained bruises when he fled from an armed group of settlers that attacked and chased him from his land near Hebron. Settlers also reportedly attacked a group of shepherds in the same area. (Ma'an News Agency)

President Abbas said that he will attend a Qatari-proposed mini summit of the League of Arab States in Cairo if he was invited as the sole representative of the Palestinian people. He added, "Elections will be held in three months," noting that the Central Elections Commission had almost completed its preparations.

"There are no differences between us that require all these efforts to reconcile," he said, adding that Fatah and Hamas had agreed in earlier Egyptian and Qataribrokered deals on forming a transitional Government and holding elections. "Let's go straight and form the Government," Mr. Abbas said. Hamas spokesman Sami Abu Zuhri was reported as saying: "One side is using its relationships to impose itself while the other side, who won legitimacy through elections, is not enjoying that legitimacy." According to the father of a 16-year-old boy from the East Jerusalem area of Silwan, the boy was on his way to school when he was attacked and beaten by 12 settlers near the Al-Maghariba gate. (WAFA)

According to Yousef al-Faqeeh, a Palestinian official, the Israeli authorities had cut off water pumped to 10 villages located north-west of Jerusalem. He said that students in schools had particularly been suffering from the situation. (WAFA)

Israeli police injured a number of protesters and arrested nine Palestinians while suppressing a demonstration in Jerusalem condemning the death of prisoner Maysara Abu Hamdiyeh. The protestors hurled stones towards the police, who fired tear gas canisters and used batons to disperse them in return. In Beit Ummar, north of Hebron, several people suffered from suffocation in clashes that erupted with Israeli forces over Abu Hamdiyeh's death. (WAFA)

Israeli forces raided several areas in Nablus, leading to clashes with residents, and set up a flying checkpoint. (WAFA)

Israeli forces arrested eight Palestinians from the West Bank towns of Bethlehem, Hebron and Jenin. (petra.gov.jo)

Five Israelis from the settlement outpost of "Esh Kodesh" near Nablus were arrested on suspicion of shooting and wounding two Palestinians in February, Israeli Army Radio reported. The suspects, who were from the "Esh Kodesh" settlement near Nablus, were believed to have shot two men from the neighbouring Palestinian village of Qusra during a confrontation, the radio said. The police reportedly found a weapons cache at the outpost during an overnight raid. (uk.news.yahoo)

A Palestinian was convicted by the Ofer Military Court of murdering a settler and his 1-year-old son in a stone-throwing attack that caused the Israeli to lose control of his vehicle in the West Bank settlement of "Kiryat Arba" in September 2011. (Haaretz)

Palestinian officials accused Israel of not providing adequate medical care at the Eshel Prison for Palestinian prisoner Hamdiyeh who died of cancer. Palestinian prisoners protested following news of his death and prison guards fired tear gas to quell disturbances in cell blocks. Three prisoners and six guards were evacuated for medical treatment after inhaling tear gas. (AP)

Palestinian Prime Minister Salam Fayyad said that the "policy of medical negligence" was the central reason for the death of Abu Hamdiyeh and demanded that

Israeli prisons be opened to international regulation, monitoring and scrutiny. (Ynetnews)

Hamas leaders called for a third intifada to support prisoners at mass rallies across the Gaza Strip after the death of Abu Hamdiyeh in Israeli custody. In Gaza City, thousands of protesters marched to a mourning tent in Al-Saraya square, chanting slogans calling on factions to support prisoners and free them from Israel. Similar marches were held north of the Gaza Strip and in Rafah. (Ma'an News Agency)

Abdulnasser Farwana, a Palestinian researcher specializing in prisoners' cases, reported that Israel had arrested 1,070 Palestinians since the start of the year, including 234 children. During the past three months, 234 children had been arrested, while 200 were arrested during the same period of time the previous year. An 8.4 per cent rise in the rate of Israeli arrests of Palestinians had been recorded in the first quarter of the year compared to the previous quarter. (Palestine News Network)

Palestinian militants launched several rockets into southern Israel, as Israeli aircraft struck targets in the Gaza Strip in the heaviest exchange of fire between the sides since the ceasefire in November. In a statement, Israeli Minister of Defense Moshe Ya'alon said, "We will not allow shooting of any sort (even sporadic) towards our citizens and our forces". But just around the time Mr. Ya'alon was speaking, two more rockets exploded in the Israeli border town of Sderot, according to police. The Israeli military said that a total of five rockets had been fired in the last 24 hours, including two that exploded prematurely inside Gaza. No casualties had been reported as a result of all the strikes. (AP)

Israeli troops shot dead two Palestinian teenagers in a clash in Tulkarm in the northern West Bank. The Israeli army said that troops had opened fire on rioters hurling fire bombs at a military post there. According to Palestinian security officials, Amer Nassar, 16, was hit by a bullet in the head, and the body of his 17-yearold cousin, Naji Balbisi, was discovered near an army checkpoint, with wounds to the chest. (AFP)

Israeli soldiers fired tear gas and rubber bullets at dozens of Palestinian youths who participated in demonstrations near the Ofer Prison near Ramallah protesting the death of Abu Hamdiyeh, injuring seven of them. (Ma'an News Agency)

An Israeli military spokeswoman said that Israeli forces had detained 20 Palestinians in pre-dawn raids across the West Bank. (Ma'an News Agency)

In a statement, United Nations Special Coordinator for the Middle East Peace Process Robert Serry, following the most recent firing of rockets from Caza, appealed for calm saying that he was "worried" that tensions could threaten the informal truce. "It is of paramount importance to refrain from violence in this tense atmosphere and for parties to work constructively in addressing the underlying issues," he said. (unsco.org)

Robert Turner, Director of Operations for the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) in Gaza praised the "quick and generous donation of \$15.6 million by the Saudi Fund for Development. In a statement, he said, "Over 7,000 refugee families in Caza will receive financial support from UNRWA to repair and reconstruct homes damaged during the November conflict. ... We have never before been able to provide this scale of support for wardamaged refugees." (unrwa.org)

Israeli police launched an investigation into an assault on an 80-year-old Palestinian shepherd who was severely beaten near the "Avnei Hefetz" settlement. He suffered multiple fractures and lost consciousness. (Haaretz)

An autopsy on the body of Palestinian prisoner Hamdiyeh was conducted at the Abu Dis Institute of Forensic Medicine in Tel Aviv on orders of PA Attorney General Abdul Ghani Oweiwi. The autopsy, done in the presence of Palestinian and Arab doctors, found that he had indeed died of cancer. (Ma'an News Agency, The Jerusalem Post)

Some 4,600 Palestinian prisoners in Israeli jails started a three-day hunger strike following the death of Abu Hamdiyeh that the PA blamed on Israeli medical negligence. (The Jerusalem Post)

Palestinian liaison officials secured the release of two boys, aged 14, from Israeli custody, who had been arrested on suspicion of throwing stones. (Ma'an News Agency)

Palestine must join the International Criminal Court (ICC) to stop Israel from committing crimes against Palestinian prisoners, PA Minister for Prisoners' Affairs Issa Qaraqe said. Mr. Qaraqe said that Israel did not abide by international and humanitarian principles, and that Palestine must head to the ICC to protect Palestinians from Israel's "continuous crimes against humanity". (Ma'an News Agency)

Israeli authorities informed a Palestinian farmer from the village of Nahalin, west of Bethlehem, of their intention to take over his land for settlement expansion, according to a local activist. The land had recently been rehabilitated and planted with olive and almond trees. The notice, he said, gave the farmer 45 days to file a petition at Israeli courts. (WAFA)

The Palestinian Human Rights Organizations Council and the Arab Association for Human Rights issued a statement on the death of prisoner Abu Hamdiyeh demanding that UN Secretary-General Ban Ki Moon immediately intervene and form an international committee to investigate the circumstances surrounding the health of and medical care provided to Palestinian prisoners and detainees in Israeli custody, as well as the circumstances in the death of prisoner Hamdiyeh, and intervene to secure the release of all sick prisoners. (addameer.ps)

Several rockets were fired at Israel from Gaza, and one exploded in Israel, causing no injuries. (AP)

A UK Foreign Office spokesperson, speaking in reaction to the deaths of two Palestinian teenagers in the West Bank, said "We are deeply concerned about the deaths of two Palestinian teenagers in the West Bank and reports of the Israeli military being attacked with firebombs. It is a tragedy when any young person's life is cut short. We urge the parties to take steps towards de-escalation and to exercise restraint. We expect a full investigation into the incident". (www.gov.uk)

Israel's military response to protests in the West Bank was failing to respect the human rights of Palestinians, Amnesty International said, as the number of Palestinian civilians killed by Israeli fire in the area since the beginning of 2013 reached eight. (www.amnestv.org)

Israel bears full responsibility for the current tensions in the West Bank because of its use of lethal force against demonstrators, Palestinian President Abbas said. (The Jerusalem Post)

Following the death of Palestinians during the funeral of Palestinian prisoner Maisara Abu Hamdiyeh, clashes continued across the West Bank. A Ma'an News Agency reporter said that a CNN cameraman had been shot and injured by a live bullet during the clashes. Additionally, 21 Palestinians had been hit by rubbercoated bullets, while dozens had suffered from tear gas inhalation. (Ma'an News Agency)

Israeli forces detained a Palestinian north of Ramallah. (Ma'an News Agency)

A Palestinian official, speaking on conditions of anonymity, reportedly said that President Abbas would temporarily refrain from unilateral actions in order to give

US-brokered efforts to jumpstart peace talks a "sufficient chance to succeed". (AFP, Ynetnews)

Bolivian President Evo Morales met with the Palestinian Monetary Authority Governor Jihad Al-Wazir in La Paz and expressed support for Palestinian President Abbas. (Ma'an News Agency)

Speaking at a conference in Cairo, newly re-elected Hamas leader Mashaal pledged to work to end the rift between Hamas and Fatah. (AFP)

Acting President of Tunisia Moncef Marzouki, during his meeting with a delegation of Hamas and Islamic Jihad, stressed the importance of achieving Palestinian reconciliation, adding that Tunisia was ready to play an "active" role in the reconciliation efforts. (TAP)

The European Union made a contribution to the payment of the March salaries and pensions of about 76,000 Palestinian civil servants and pensioners in the West Bank and the Caza Strip. Approximately €11.75 million had been channelled by the European Commission through the European mechanism for support to Palestinians (PEGASE). (ReliefWeb)

Ahead of Palestinian Children's Day, the Palestinian Central Bureau of Statistics said that children under the age of 18 made up almost 2 million of a total 4.29 million Palestinian population in the West Bank and Gaza Strip. (WAFA)

The Israeli military handed a Palestinian in Hebron a notice to demolish two water wells and uproot trees on his land. (Haaretz)

A Palestinian prisoner who suffered serious physical and psychological injury following alleged torture by Shin Bet 18 months ago had filed a petition at Israel's High Court asking that the military prosecution be instructed to intervene in the case. (Haaretz)

Commenting on the escalation and demonstrators breaking into an UNRWA compound, Director of UNRWA Operations in Gaza Robert Turner said that all relief and distribution centres will consequently remain closed until guarantees are given by all relevant groups that UNRWA operations can continue unhindered. (www.unrwa.org, Reuters)

Israel's Permanent Representative to the UN Ron Prosor called on the Security Council to condemn the recent rocket fire from the Caza Strip into southern Israel. (The Jerusalem Post)

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After a preliminary probing into the killing of two Palestinians in the West Bank, the Israel Defense Forces said that the shooting was according to protocol and soldiers had followed rules of engagement, adding that the commander of a unit opened live fire when he felt that his life had been in danger. (Haaretz, Ynetnews)

Hamas leaders had reportedly urged UNRWA to reconsider its suspension of food aid for Palestine refugees that had been imposed after protesters stormed one of the UNRWA distribution centres in Gaza. (Middle East Online)

The Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People discussed political development and the West Bank unrest and its upcoming meeting in Caracas. Riyad Mansour, Permanent Observer of the State of Palestine to the UN, told the Committee that it was "a critical time for Member States to put pressure on Israel to comply with international law in order to open the door to a meaningful political process that would lead to a two-State solution." (UN press release GA/PAL/1261)

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The IDF arrested 3 Palestinians, including a 10-year-old child, in Hebron, and 1 Palestinian in Bethlehem (IMEMC)

A rocket fired from the Gaza Strip into southern Israel landed in an open area. No injuries or damage were reported in the attack. (The Jerusalem Post)

Canadian Minister for Foreign Affairs John Baird met in Ramallah with Palestinian President Abbas, Prime Minister Fayyad, and Minister for Foreign Affairs Riad Malki to discuss regional developments. At a news conference in Ramallah, Mr. Baird said that Canada would see the funding agreement through to the end but hedged on whether it would be renewed. "We have some profound difference of opinion on the way forward," he said. (AP, Reuters, The Canadian Press)

Palestinian Ambassador to Lebanon Ashraf Dabour said that some 160,000 Palestinians lived below the poverty line in refugee camps in Lebanon. (Ma'an News Agency)

Gaza-based human rights organizations issued a letter to UN Special Coordinator for the Middle East Peace process Serry expressing concern at a number of recent statements he had made, pointing out "his failure" to condemn Israeli violations of the ceasefire agreement and the harsh punitive measures taken by Israeli authorities against the Gaza Strip. (Reliefweb)

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The IDF stopped a Palestinian near Bethlehem with three homemade bombs and four Molotov cocktails. (The Jerusalem Post)

Two Palestinians were critically injured during clashes with Israeli soldiers in the town of Al-Khadr, south of Bethlehem. (WAFA)

President Abbas met with US Secretary of State John Kerry to discuss reviving Israeli-Palestinian peace talks. According to Palestinian officials, Mr. Kerry offered to ensure Israel does not withhold Palestinian tax revenue in the future, to extend PA jurisdiction in Area C, and to allow Palestinians to build more freely in Area C. President Abbas responded that Israel must stop illegal settlement building and release Palestinian prisoners first, according to the officials. (Ma'an News Agency, Reuters)

Prime Minister Netanyahu and other senior Israeli officials met with Secretary of State Kerry. Mr. Kerry also met privately with Palestinian Prime Minister Fayyad and Israeli President Shimon Peres. (Ynetnews)

Palestinian National Economy Minister Jawad Naji Awad Hirzallah said that the 2013 domestic economy was on track for 5 to 6 per cent growth for the year as a shortfall in international aid continued to take its toll. The forecast was far below the average growth rate in 2010 and 2011, which stood at around 11 per cent. (Al Arabiya)

A group of settlers sprayed racist graffiti on the walls of two mosques, east of Bethlehem, and slashed several tires of Palestinian-owned cars. (WAFA)

An Israeli court ordered Israeli settlers to return land to Palestinian owners. The judge had deemed that the sale of 100 dunums within the "Alfei Menashe" settlement was fraudulent. (Haaretz)

Hundreds of Israeli websites came under attack from hackers said to be affiliated with the group "Anonymous". Dozens of Government and private websites were disrupted. (The Wall Street Journal)

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US Secretary of State Kerry said that he was trying to break down mistrust between Israelis and Palestinians and would not rush into a new peace process. (Reuters)
US Secretary of State Kerry said that he was hoping to use the economic development of Palestinian areas in the West Bank as a means to build support for a new set of Middle East peace negotiations. He said that moving on the economic front could change perceptions and realities on the ground, "all of which can contribute to forward momentum". (The New York Times)

The League of Arab State's Middle East Peace Follow-up Committee met in Doha to discuss ways to revive the stalled peace process and will send a mission to Washington, D.C. The Committee, chaired by Qatar, is composed of Algeria, Bahrain, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Palestine, Saudi Arabia, Sudan, Tunisia and Yemen. Secretary-General Nabil Elaraby said, "This meeting was to discuss the mission of the Arab delegation that will visit Washington" later during the month. (AFP, Morocco World News)

Israeli authorities barred two Members of the Moroccan Parliament accompanying parliamentarians from the European Union from crossing into the West Bank to meet Palestinian officials. (AFP)

At the Palestinian Legislative Council in Ramallah, journalists and human rights groups met with members of the Middle East Committee of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe (PACE) that included briefings on the status quo of Palestinian prisoners and Israeli violations of the rights of journalists to free movement and access to information. PACE members announced that they would prepare a report on administrative detention. (Palestine News Network)

Israeli authorities closed the Kerem Shalom crossing located south-east of Rafah, the only terminal through which goods, humanitarian aid and fuel enter the Caza Strip. (WAFA)

Hundreds of Gazan fishermen took part in a nautical protest against the restrictions placed on them by Israel. (Middle East Monitor)

The residents of Sebastia celebrated the success of their campaign that aimed at shutting off a pipe that was pumping raw sewage onto their land from the nearby settlement "Shave Shomron." (IMEMC)

Gisha, the Legal Centre for the Freedom of Movement issued a statement in response to the IDF's closing of the Kerem Shalom border passage between Israel and Gaza and questioned the effectiveness of closing crossings to stop rocket fire into Israel. Gisha essentially implied that such policy strengthened Hamas. (The

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According to witnesses, Israeli forces crossed the Gaza border, entering 300 metres into eastern Khan Yunis. Four Israeli tanks and three army bulldozers also raided and razed agricultural land while shooting in all directions. (WAFA)

An Israeli border policeman was convicted of robbing a Palestinian store in the West Bank. (Haaretz)

In a statement, the Palestinian Ministry for Prisoners' Affairs said that Fadi Abu al-Asal, 20, and his brother, were arrested after an Israeli force raided his home in Anabta in the West Bank. Mr. Abu al-Asal was wounded a week earlier when Israeli soldiers opened fire on Palestinians near a checkpoint in Tulkarm, killing two. The IDF also raided the Shweikeh neighbourhood of Tulkarm, arresting two Palestinians. (Ma'an News agency)

The Israeli army arrested nine Palestinians in the West Bank. (WAFA)

According to Palestinian officials, the IDF uprooted 100 olive trees and 250 almond trees from a land owned by two brothers in south Dahriya in the Hebron district. (WAFA)

Palestinian President Abbas, who had attended the meeting of the Middle East Peace Follow-up Committee in Doha the previous day, met with the Emir of Qatar, Sheikh Hamad bin Khalifa Al Thani, and discussed Palestinian reconciliation . (WAFA)

US Secretary of State Kerry's suggestion to revive the Arab Peace Initiative by revising it, as raised during his visit to Ramallah on 7 April, was rejected by Palestinian leaders. Palestinian Chief Negotiator Erakat said, "Kerry asked us to change a few words in the Arab Peace Initiative but we refused." A senior State Department official said that Mr. Kerry wanted the plan "enhanced". (AP)

Palestinian Minister for Foreign Affairs Malki said that the delegation of the Middle East Peace Follow-up Committee to Washington, D.C., will meet with President Obama and Secretary of State Kerry. (AFP)

Secretary of State Kerry and Prime Minister Netanyahu met and claimed progress in preparing for possible new peace talks. "We were pleased with the substance of the discussion and agreed each of us to do some homework," Mr. Kerry said about their meeting during the day and their working dinner the previous day. (The Washington Post)

WAFA reported that the IDF had informed eight Bedouin families of Ein el-Hilweh in the northern Jordan Valley that they had until 30 April to evacuate their shacks. The head of the Al-Maleh local council, Aref Daraghme, said that the shacks and tents had been on the land for several years. (Ma'an News Agency)

Israel's Minister of Housing, Uri Ariel, said that 50 new homes would be built in the East Talpiot area of East Jerusalem to house Holocaust survivors. (www.naharnet.com/)

Israeli bulldozers demolished shelters and water well in the Al-Duryat area near Hebron, saying that the area was a closed military zone. In the Jericho area, Israeli forces ordered eight families to demolish their homes. (Ma'an News Agency)

Survivors of the Israeli raid in 2010 on the MV Mavi Marmara said that Israel's apology to Turkey over the killing of nine Turks aboard the ship that had been part of a flotilla to Caza had not gone far enough and that Israeli soldiers would be pursued in court. (Reuters)

Turkish-Israeli reconciliation talks had been postponed to 22 April at Turkey's request. Meetings were to take place on 11 April between Turkish officials and National Security Council head Yaakov Amidror regarding compensation to the families of the victims of the flotilla raid. (Ynetnews.com)

After days of closure due to protests against aid cuts, UNRWA will resume distributing food aid to refugees in the Gaza Strip. In a statement, the Agency said, "UNRWA respects the right to protest peacefully, but employees must be secure and safe." (Ma'an News Agency)

Israeli forces crossed the border with Gaza into the eastern part of Khan Yunis for the second day in a row, razing agricultural land and firing in all directions. (WAFA)

Guatemala had recognized Palestine as a State that it believed would help bring about a peace agreement with Israel, the Office of the President said. (The Jerusalem Post)

A Palestinian delegation headed by the Minister of Religious Affairs, Mahmoud Al-Habbash, met with Sri Lanka's President, Mahinda Rajapaksa, to discuss issues such as the importance of religious tolerance, Palestinian politics and the stalled Israeli-Palestinian peace process. Sri Lanka had supported the GA resolution that granted Palestine non-Member Observer State status in November 2012. (News360)

Palestinian Prime Minister Fayyad offered his resignation following a rift with President Abbas over his Government policy but reports were contradictory. (AP, Haaretz, Reuters)

Fatah's Azzam Al-Ahmed and Hamas' Musa Abu Marzouk held talks in Cairo to discuss the implementation of previous reconciliation agreements signed between the two parties. Mr. Al-Ahmed said that President Abbas was scheduled to meet with Hamas leader Mashaal in the coming days to discuss issues pertaining to a unity government as well as presidential and parliamentary elections. (*The Jerusalem Post*)

UK International Development Minister Alan Duncan announced during a visit to the Occupied Palestinian Territory a new £15 million programme that would help Palestinian firms develop new products and target new markets. He also said that the Department for International Development would implement a series of programmes aimed at harnessing Palestinian youth power to activate their role in their society and create a better future. The Popular Committee Against the Siege said that Israel was holding up 1,000 truckloads of goods at the Kerem Shalom crossing that had been closed since 8 April. (Ma'an News Agency)

Israel kept the Gaza Strip's only commercial crossing point, Kerem Shalom, closed for the third day in a row due to security concerns. (Xinhua)

Hamas officials had been holding a series of closed-door meetings in Doha over the past days to distribute positions on the new members of its Politburo and talk about national reconciliation. Senior Hamas leader Ahmed Yousef said the meetings also focused on convincing European countries to remove Hamas from their lists of terrorist organizations. (Ma'an News Agency)

Turkish Prime Minister Erdoğan confirmed his plans to visit the Gaza Strip later in May despite attempts by President Abbas and US Secretary of State Kerry to bring about the cancellation of the trip. (Hürriyet Daily News, Ma'ariv)

President Abbas met with his Turkish counterpart, Abdullah Gül, in Istanbul, and briefed him on the progress of the Palestinian national reconciliation and the efforts to revive the stalled peace process. (Palestine News Network)

Fatah official Jamal Muhissen said that Egypt remained the sole sponsor of the Palestinian national reconciliation, reacting to Egyptian media reports stating that President Abbas intended to bring Turkey as mediator. (Xinhua)

The former Attorney General of Israel, Michael Ben-Yair, stated that "the settlement movement is a political act by a State against another people and as such is the most evil and immoral act since the end of World War II". (Yediot Ahronot)

"We are pursuing efforts to ensure correct labelling of settlement goods as tasked by the [European] Council," a European Union spokesperson said. Minister for Foreign Affairs from Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Ireland, Luxembourg, Malta, The Netherlands, Portugal, Slovenia, Spain and the UK had written to EU High Representative for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy Ashton applauding the work on the legal guidelines. (The Jerusalem Post)

Israel opened the Kerem Shalom crossing for the limited transfer of building materials for projects under construction. Goods for other sectors and cooking gas will also be among the goods that will be allowed delivery into the Gaza Strip. (Ma'an News Agency)

Shireen Issawi, sister of long-term hunger striker Issawi, was assaulted by Israeli police as she tried to enter the Kaplan hospital to attend a court hearing for her brother. Mr. Issawi had been on hunger strike for over 270 days. (Ma'an News Agency)

Palestinian officials said that Palestinian prisoner Issawi had agreed to end an on-off hunger strike which lasted for more than eight months, agreeing to a deal

brokered by Israeli and Palestinian officials to serve eight more months for allegedly violating bail conditions, after which he would be freed to his Jerusalem home, Qadura Fares, head of the Palestinian Prisoners Society, said. (Reuters)

EU Representative to the West Bank, Gaza Strip and UNRWA John Catt-Rutter and Palestinian Minister of Foreign Affairs Malki presented the "2012 European Neighbourhood Policy" progress report for Palestine, highlighting steady progress in cooperation despite challenges. (European External Action Service) Spanish Minister for Foreign Affairs Carcía-Margallo told Israel's President Peres that President Abbas had asked him to convey the message that he would like to see confidence-building measures. (The Jerusalem Post)

An informed source told *Asharq Al-Awsat* that President Abbas intends to wait for the outcome of the reconciliation efforts between Fatah and Hamas before forming a new Government. However, if an agreement becomes unlikely, he will form a Government, the source said. (www.aawsat.net)

Israelis and Palestinians agreed to renewed involvement by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) in the Old City of Jerusalem. UNESCO's inspectors will visit the Old City on 19 May to inspect renovation and rehabilitation projects, but will not visit the Al-Haram Al-Sharif/Temple Mount. As part of the arrangement, Palestinians agreed to postpone five resolutions critical of Israel that were pending before UNESCO. (The New York Times, Haaretz)

Israel opened the Kerem Shalom crossing for the export of one truckload of herbs and spices to Europe. Some 350 trucks loaded with goods and cement and building materials for international projects entered the Strip. (Ma'an News Agency)

The European Union contributed \$2 million under the Palestinian Government's "Private Sector Reconstruction in Gaza" programme. (European External Action Service)

Israeli authorities demolished several agricultural structures and tents in the northern Jordan Valley area of the West Bank. (WAFA)

Israeli soldiers destroyed olive trees planted the previous year by the Palestinian residents of Susiya village, in the south Hebron Hill, according to witnesses and international activists. (WAFA)

Settlers from "Ofra" torched 10 cars in the village of Deir Jarir, east of Ramallah, according to witnesses. (WAFA)

UNRWA will start distributing food aid to refugees in Gaza the following day, a spokesman said. The agency had suspended food aid after protesters stormed a depot on 4 April demanding the reinstatement of cash allowances. (Ma'an News Agency)

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The IDF raided at dawn the Halima al-Sa'deya mosque and a family house in Jenin. (Ma'an News Agency)

The IDF arrested at dawn two brothers, aged 16 and 18, in the town of Tako', east of Bethlehem. (Ma'an News Agency)

The Israeli navy opened fire on a number of Palestinian fishing boats off the Gaza coast, forcing them to go back to the shore. (Palestine News Network)

Undercover Israeli forces shot a Palestinian man and detained three others in the Issawiya neighbourhood in East Jerusalem. (Ma'an News Agency)

Waal al-Arja, a Palestinian who, in September 2011, hurled stones at [a settler's] car causing it to crash and killing [the settler] and his son, was convicted of murder and sentenced to 98 years in prison. (Haaretz)

Knesset member Orit Strock demanded a law amendment to let Israeli settlers defend their property with live fire. (Haaretz)

The IDF demolished several residential and commercial buildings in the East Jerusalem neighbourhood of At-Tur under the pretext that they lacked construction permits. (Ma'an News Agency)

The IDF, accompanied by border guards, staff from the Israeli planning and building committee, the Civil Administration and heavy machinery, demolished three Palestinian-owned houses in the Arroub refugee camp, north of Hebron, and buildozed several olive, fig, and grape trees. (Ma'an News Agency)

Popular Committees Coordinator Rateb al-Jbour said that the IDF had handed down a stop work order to halt the construction of a rehabilitation centre in the Susiya village in Area C. Also in the same Hebron area, four demolition orders had been delivered to residents of the nearby Qawawes in Yatta. (Ma'an News Agency) IDF forces with bulldozers and tanks entered 300 metres into an area of land used for farming east of Beit Hanoun in the Caza Strip. (Ma'an News Agency)

Lebanese security officials said that a grenade left behind from the 2007 fighting in the Nahr el-Bared Palestine refugee camp in northern Lebanon exploded and wounded seven schoolchildren. (AP)

UN Under-Secretary-General for Political Affairs Jeffrey Feltman briefed the Security Council on the situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian question, saying "There is now an opening to develop a meaningful initiative to achieve the negotiated two-State solution that will best serve the interests, rights, and aspirations of Israelis and Palestinians." A critical point was approaching for the viability of the peace process. "Whether that prospect solidifies or vanishes will depend on the direction that leaders on both sides chose to take," he said, as well as on the level of regional and international support for new efforts. (UN press release SC/10985)

Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon had rejected the comments made by UN Special Rapporteur on the situation of human rights in the Palestinian territories occupied since 1967 Richard Falk concerning the Boston bombing. A UN spokesperson said: "The Secretary-General is hopeful that Special Rapporteurs such as Mr. Falk understand that while they have independent status, their public comments can undermine the credibility and the work of the United Nations." (UN News Centre) 25

Palestinians in Gaza said that Israeli military forces entered farmland east of Khan Yunis with eight bulldozers accompanied by tanks. No clashes were reported. (Ma'an News Agency)

A local official said that the Israeli navy had opened fire on Palestinian fishing boats off the Gaza coast as they approached the 3 mile limit. (Ma'an News Agency)
A 17-year-old student was hit by a bullet in his foot during clashes with Israeli soldiers in Abu Dis, east of Jerusalem, according to local sources. (WAFA)
Israeli forces were deployed at the Arroub refugee camp, north of Hebron, after three Molotov cocktails were thrown at an IDF post nearby, and raided several houses. Stones were also thrown at setters' cars passing by the "Gush Etzion" settlement block, west of Bethlehem, and Israeli forces carried out a search campaign at the area. They handed three Palestinians notices to report for interrogation. (Palestine News Network)

According to Palestinian sources, the IDF arrested eight Palestinians from Jerusalem, Jenin and Hebron after raiding their homes. (WAFA)

According to US sources, the US Administration was planning to convene a four-way Middle East peace summit in which President Obama, Prime Minister Netanyahu, President Abbas and Jordan's King Abdullah will participate. The Summit was slated to convene in Washington, D.C., in June with the possible participation of Turkey, Egypt and other Arab countries. However, a State Department spokesman said: "We have seen the media reports of a planned Middle East summit in Washington. These reports are not true... I can confirm that the Secretary [of State] looks forward to meeting with the ministerial delegation representing the Arab Peace Initiative Follow-up Committee in Washington... [on] 29 April. Qatari Prime Minister and Minister for Foreign Affairs Hamad bin Jassim... will lead the visiting delegation." (Haaretz, www.state.gov)

A Palestinian senior official said that President Abbas and members of the Palestinian leadership were disappointed with the futility of US Secretary of State Kerry's efforts to revive peace talks. Another Palestinian official in Ramallah said that "The question is not if Kerry fails, but when." (*The Times of Israel*) Senior sources in the US and Israel said that the Obama Administration was preparing a multi-billion-dollar economic initiative that would bring international businesses and major infrastructure projects to the West Bank. Secretary of State Kerry had already secured approval in principle from Prime Minister Netanyahu,

President Abbas, the head of Coca-Cola and other major international companies. Quartet Representative Tony Blair was also involved in an advisory capacity. Mr. Netanyahu was reportedly against the release of Area C land, the exploitation of natural gas fields off the coast of Gaza, and the opening of an international airport controlled by the Palestinians. Mr. Kerry had assured the Palestinians that the economic projects will not come at the expense of diplomatic issues. (The Times of Israel)

Raed Fattouh, a Palestinian liaison official, said that Israeli authorities had opened the Kerem Shalom goods crossing into Caza for the export of goods to Europe. Israel had also permitted the entry of 320 trucks loaded with goods for various sectors in Caza as well as limited quantities of cooking gas. (Ma'an News Agency) Hamas condemned a reported decision by the PA to postpone five UNESCO resolutions following US intervention. "This step is like a reward to the occupation for

its crimes and violations," Hamas Spokesman Fawzi Barhoum said. "It is a contribution to erasing the Arabic and Islamic identity of Jerusalem, and it encourages the occupation to continue its Judaization programme." (Ma'an News Agency)

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Israel said that it was phasing out white phosphorus smokescreen munitions whose use during its 2008-2009 offensives in Gaza drew war crimes allegations. (Reuters)

Israeli soldiers fired tear gas and rubber bullets to disperse some 500 Palestinian villagers from Deir Jarir, near Ramallah, marching towards a settlement outpost. The procession, preceded by a group of stone-throwing youths, followed charges by Palestinians that settlers had attacked them twice this week. (Haaretz) Spanish Minister for Foreign Affairs García-Margallo had rescinded a plan to establish an honorary consular office in Gaza. (PRNewswire)

The European Union expressed "serious concern" regarding the demolition of 22 Palestinian structures in eight locations across the West Bank, including East Jerusalem. The EU statement said that the demolitions had displaced 28 Palestinians, including 18 children, and that some of the demolished structures had been funded by EU member States. (European External Action Service)

Israel was expected to continue the construction of the wall around a convent near Beit Jala, after the convent lost a seven-year legal battle. It would separate a small community of elderly nuns from 75 per cent of their land. The playground of a school run by the nuns will be bordered on three sides by the wall. More than 50 Palestinian families would lose free access to their agricultural land. The campaign against the barrier at the site had been taken up by UK Foreign Secretary William Hague and the Archbishop of Westminster. (*The Guardian*)

Israel must release a Palestinian activist held without charge for two years, Amnesty International urged after his administrative detention had been extended for the sixth time without justification. Amnesty International believed that Ahmed Qatamesh, a 62-year-old academic, was being detained to deter political activities by other Palestinian left-wing activists. (www.ammesty.org)

UN Special Rapporteur on the situation of human rights in the Palestinian territories occupied since 1967 Falk declared the two-State solution "presently obsolete". Speaking in Beirut, he said that it "continues the global mirage of a negotiation ... [and] is essentially a bridge to nowhere." (The Daily Star)

A recent report on social media found that 40 per cent of the Palestinian population were active on social media, most notably Facebook, the highest in the Middle East. (Al Monitor)

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President Abbas announced the start of talks on forming a national unity Government, specifying that the consultations would take place "in accordance with the Doha Declaration and the timetable set up by the Palestinian leadership in meetings in Cairo on the reactivation of the PLO" in February. Hamas Spokesperson Abu Zuhri said that his party had not been contacted on this matter so far. (AFP, WAFA)

Israeli settlers torched at least 9 UN-owned vehicles, 1 Palestinian-owned car and 3 orchards in a southern Jerusalem neighbourhood, a local radio station reported. (Bahrain News Agency)

Egyptian security forces detained eight Palestinian tunnel smugglers in a border area near the Gaza Strip. (Ma'an News Agency)

A mortar shell fired from the Gaza Strip fell in an open area in southern Israel. No injuries or damage were reported. (Ynetnews)

Israeli air strikes targeted different parts of the Gaza Strip at dawn. Reports said that they aimed at a Hamas-run military facility and two weapons storage facilities. (IMEMC)

Israeli's Minister of Finance Yair Lapid and Minister of Economy and Trade Naftali Bennett were pushing for the Government to pass a Basic Law requiring a referendum on any peace treaty with the Palestinians. Minister of Justice Minister Livni adamantly opposed the idea. (The Jerusalem Post, Ynetnews)

Governor Tarso Genro said that Brazil's southernmost state, Rio Grande Do Sul, will donate 11,500 tons of rice to Palestine refugees through UNRWA. (Ma'an News Agency)

Developers of the first modern Palestinian city, Rawabi, said that the \$1 billion project was in jeopardy because of Israel's refusal to authorize a permanent access road for construction crews and residents to reach the city. (The Wall Street Journal)

Senior Palestinian officials warned that if Israel began construction in the E-1 area, President Abbas would go to the International Criminal Court and seek indictments of Israeli military officials on war crimes charges. (The Media Line, Ynetnews)

Israeli settlers violently attacked a 60-year-old Palestinian man in Hebron. He sustained cuts and bruises and had been moved to a local hospital. The IDF also detained three Palestinian children. (Ma'an News Agency)

The Israeli Supreme Court granted a request by the Israeli Government and postponed until 15 July the evacuation of the "Amona" outpost, established on privately owned Palestinian property near Ramallah. (Haaretz, IMEMC)

Palestinian human rights groups criticized a programme run by Hamas to teach schoolboys how to fire Kalashnikovs, throw grenades and plant improvised explosive devices. (The Telegraph)

UNRWA denied reports that it was closing its offices in Gaza after Palestinian refugees protested against the reduction in its aid service. (WAFA)

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An explosive charge detonated in front of the home of Fatah official Monther Al-Bardaweel, in Rafah in the Caza Strip, leading to excessive damage to his car and home. (IMEMC)

Chinese Special Envoy to the Middle East Wu Sike said that China was willing to exert efforts for the resumption of Israeli-Palestinian peace talks after holding separate meetings in Jerusalem with Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs Ze'ev Elkin and Minister of Justice Livni. Mr. Wu said that one of the purposes of his visit was to make preparations for the upcoming visits to China of Prime Minister Netanyahu and President Abbas, both set for early May. (Xinhua)

Palestinian importers and exporters began a strike at the Allenby Bridge crossing and cut off the transfer of goods at the bridge until 11.00 a.m. (Ynetnews)

Hundreds of truckloads of food and goods remained stranded on the Israeli side of the Kerem Shalom crossing. (Ma'an News Agency)

Israeli News One reported that the Ministry of Housing had approved the construction of an additional 120 units in "Givat Ze'ev" in Jerusalem. (IMEMC)

A Palestinian official said that Israeli settlers had planted trees on private Palestinian land near Nablus. (Ma'an News Agency)

Israeli settlers seized land in the eastern part of Yatta, south of Hebron, while the IDF demolished a well in the Al-Fawwar refugee camp, also south of Hebron. (WAFA)

Israeli soldiers evicted several hundred Bedouins from a village in the West Bank after the army had declared the area a live-fire training zone. (Reuters)

Minister of Justice Livni met twice in recent weeks with prominent Israeli settler leaders to discuss "price-tag" attacks against Palestinians and their property in the West Bank. She said that Israel will take tougher measures against perpetrators. (Haaretz)

The Israeli municipality demolished three Palestinian homes in the Jerusalem neighbourhood of al-Tur under the pretext that they had been built without permit. (WAFA)

The Red Cross reported that Israel had cancelled visits by Gaza families to their relatives in Israeli prisons. (WAFA)

The European Parliament Delegation for relations with the Palestinian Legislative Council called, in the aftermath of the "Freedom and Dignity" International Conference, for the freeing of Palestinian political prisoners from Israeli jails. (WAFA)

The IDF announced that a military court had convicted senior Hamas official Muhammed Haruyash of both involvement in and attempts to carry out terror attacks, sentencing him to 24 years in prison. (The Jerusalem Post)

The UN International Meeting on the Question of Palestine "African solidarity with the Palestinian people for the achievement of its inalienable rights, including the sovereignty and independence of the State of Palestine" opened in Addis Ababa. Carlos Lopes, Executive Secretary of the Economic Commission for Africa and Representative of the Secretary-General; Abdou Salam Diallo, Chairman of the Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People, and Taysir Khaled, member of the Executive Committee of the PLO and Representative of the State of Palestine, opened the meeting. (UN press release GA/PAL/1267) Welcoming renewed international engagement in the peace process, Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, in his message to the UN International Meeting on the Question of Palestine in Addis Ababa that building on that support required Israeli and Palestinian political leaders to "move beyond words" and tackle final status issues in a

constructive spirit. (UN press release SG/SM/14993-GA/PAL/1266)

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A Palestinian was killed in an Israeli missile strike in Caza. The Israeli military described the target as a "key terror figure" who manufactured rockets and explosive devices. Palestinian officials said that he was a police officer. (The New York Times)

A settler from "Yizhar" was stabbed to death by a Palestinian who then grabbed the settler's firearm and fired at security forces who shot and wounded the assailant. Dozens of settlers then threw stones at Palestinian vehicles, said Israeli police Spokesman Micky Rosenfeld. A bus driver was injured by glass and five settlers were arrested. There were also reports that Palestinian fields were set ablaze. (The New York Times)

Israeli forces closed down the Hawara and Zatara checkpoints after hundreds of settlers marched towards the Zatara checkpoint where a settler had been stabbed to death. PA settlement affairs official Ghassan Daghlas said that settlers set fire to over seven acres of olive fields in the Awarta village east of Nablus. (Ma'an News Agency)

Violent clashes erupted between young Palestinians and Israeli troops after settlers attacked a mosque in Nablus. An Israeli military spokeswoman said that some 40 Israelis had hurled rocks at Palestinian vehicles, wounding three Palestinians. Israeli soldiers dispersed the riot, she said. (Ma'an News Agency)

British Foreign Office Minister for the Middle East, Alistair Burt, commenting on the violence in the West Bank and Gaza, said that at this critical time for the two-State solution, "we need dialogue, not violence". He also condemned the rocket attacks from Gaza, the killing of an Israeli settler in the West Bank and expressed deep concern about the recent spate of violent attacks by extremist settlers. (www.gov.uk)

The Palestinian Government called on the Israeli Government to curb settlers' attacks against the Palestinian people in the West Bank. (Xinhua)

Israeli forces arrested six Palestinians from Bethlehem, Nablus, and Hebron, according to local and security sources. (WAFA)

Speaking on behalf of a delegation of the League of Arab States to Washington, D.C., Qatari Prime Minister Sheikh Hamad Bin Jassim Bin Jabr Al-Thani called for an Israeli-Palestinian agreement based on the 1967 borders and cited the possibility of "comparable", mutually agreed and "minor" land swaps. He spoke after meeting with US Vice-President Joe Biden and Secretary of State Kerry to discuss the Arab Peace Initiative. Top officials from the League, Bahrain, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Palestine and Saudi Arabia attended the meeting. (AP)

US Secretary of State Kerry said that the Arab League's acknowledgment of the possibility of a land swap between Israelis and Palestinians was "a very big step forward" adding, "We are going to continue to march forward and try to bring people to the table despite the difficulties and the disappointments of the past". (Reuters)

Israeli Minister of Justice Livni called the Arab announcement an "important message". While she indicated that she had some concerns about the plan's details, she said that Israel should respond positively. Prime Minister Netanyahu had no immediate comment. (AP)

Palestinian Chief Negotiator Erakat said that the Arab League position "is not something new". Upon Israel's unequivocal acceptance of the two-State solution on the 1967 borders, the State of Palestine, as a sovereign country, might consider minor agreed border modifications," he said. (Ma'an News Agency)

In Washington, D.C., Palestine's Minister for Foreign Affairs Malki told reporters that Palestinians had agreed to suspend their request to join the International Criminal Court and UN agencies in order to give a fair chance to US efforts to restart peace talks, on condition that Israel does not start settlement construction in area E-1 as a temporary "goodwill" gesture. He said that the Arab Ministers for Foreign Affairs were hoping for another meeting with Mr. Kerry in four to six weeks. (The Jerusalem Post, www.politico.com)

Pope Francis met with Israel's President Peres at Vatican City urging Israelis and Palestinians to resume talks and make "courageous decisions" to bring peace. The Pope also accepted an invitation to visit the Holy Land. (uk.news.yahoo.com)

Palestinian Christians from Beit Jala, near Bethlehem, had urged Pope Francis to speak out against an Israeli decision to build its separation barrier on a route that they say would cut off their community from its lands and from Jerusalem. (Ma'an News Agency)

Israeli Minister for Construction and Housing Uri Ariel told Prime Minister Netanyahu that if the 2013 budget does not allocate funds to the construction of settlements, the budget will not win the approval of Ariel's Jewish Home party. (Ynetnews)

According to UNRWA, Palestine refugees in Syria were being killed, injured and displaced in greater numbers than ever before as the armed conflict continued to overwhelm camps across the country. UNRWA estimated that approximately 235,000 refugees had been displaced inside Syria. (www.unrwa.org)
