Protection of Civilians Weekly Report

4 April – 10 April 2007

Of note this week


An exceptionally high number of random or 'flying' IDF checkpoints (237) were observed this week, in particular throughout the northern West Bank. In the Qalqilya governorate, flying checkpoints were observed at eight locations on a daily basis. In addition, since 8 April, Palestinians from the Jenin governorate were prevented from entering Nablus city or moving south to other parts of the West Bank.

Gaza Strip

- Two Palestinians were killed and two others injured by the IDF in the Gaza Strip this week. A further two Palestinians, including a 17 year-old girl, died of wounds sustained during previous IDF incursions.
- Five homemade rockets were fired by Palestinian militants towards Israel, one of which landed in a Palestinian area. No injuries were reported.
- IDF vessels opened fire with machineguns in the direction of Palestinian fishing boats west of Rafah on two separate occasions, although no injuries were reported. The IDF also fired a missile at a reported rocket launch site in the northern Gaza Strip.
- Internal violence in the form of armed clashes between rival factions continued with one dead and 24 Palestinians injured. In addition, five Palestinians were killed and three others injured during an armed family feud in the southern Gaza Strip. The BBC's Gaza correspondent, Alan Johnston, remains missing, presumed kidnapped, for the fourth consecutive week.

West Bank:

- A comprehensive external closure remains in place on the West Bank (since 2 April 2007) coinciding with the Jewish Passover Holiday.
- The strike of PA health care workers continues throughout the West Bank (since 16 February 2007) in protest at the non-payment of their salaries. Public primary health care centres remain closed and hospitals are only accepting emergency life threatening cases. In addition, teachers employed by the Directorate of Education in Hebron and Bethlehem governorates went on partial strike on 10 April which was set to continue the following day.
- Two Palestinian girls, aged 11 and 12 years, and a 10 year-old Palestinian boy from the hamlet of Tuba near Yatta (Hebron), were injured when a group of Israeli settlers from the settlement of Ma'on beat them and took their schoolbags while en route to their school, in nearby Twani. The IDF and police were present.



1. Physical Protection¹

West Bank:

- **4 April:** A 27 year-old Palestinian man was injured near 'Awarta commercial checkpoint (Nablus) by IDF live fire. The IDF opened fire at his vehicle while he was using a dirt road to avoid the checkpoint. The man was arrested.
- **4 April:** An IDF soldier was injured by live ammunition in Jenin city (Jenin) during an exchange of fire between the IDF and Palestinian gunmen.
- **6 April:** Two Palestinian men, aged 25 and 28 years, were injured in 'Azzun (Qalqiliya) by shrapnel during a confrontation with the IDF near the entrance to the village.
- **6 April:** Nine Palestinians were injured by rubber-coated metal bullets fired by the IDF and Israeli Border Police during the regular demonstration organised by Palestinian, Israeli and international activists against the construction of the Barrier in Bil'in (Ramallah). Many cases of tear gas inhalation were also reported among the residents of the houses close to the Barrier (not included in weekly totals). IDF soldiers took over the roofs of these houses as look-out points and one international activist was also detained.
- **6 April:** Two Palestinian children, aged 14 and 17 years, were injured by rubber-coated metal bullets during a clash between the IDF and a group of children and youths near Qalandiya checkpoint (Ramallah).
- **6 April:** Six Palestinian men (ages unknown) and two international activists were injured in Umm Salamona village (Bethlehem) when IDF soldiers broke up the weekly demonstration in the village against the ongoing construction of the Barrier.
- **7 April:** A 30 year-old Palestinian man was injured in Jenin camp (Jenin) by live ammunition during an exchange of fire between the IDF and the Palestinian gunmen in the camp.
- **8 April:** A 32 year-old Palestinian man, a driver of a Union of Health Care Committees' ambulance, was physically assaulted and injured at a flying checkpoint near 'Arraba junction (Jenin). The IDF delayed the ambulance for an hour and caused light damage to the vehicle.
- **8 April:** A 17 year-old Palestinian male from the H1 section of Hebron city (Hebron) was injured by live-ammunition when Israeli soldiers manning the Ibrahimi checkpoint opened fire at him after he stabbed two Israeli Border Police in the vicinity of the checkpoint. The two Israeli policemen sustained light to moderate injuries. The Palestinian man was later transported by an Israeli ambulance to an Israeli hospital and arrested.
- **8 April:** A 35 year-old Palestinian man with Down syndrome from the H2 section of Hebron city (Hebron) was injured when a group of teenage Israeli settlers from the settlement of Tel Rumeida harassed and beat him.
- **8 April:** Two Palestinian girls, aged 11 and 12 years, and a 10 year-old Palestinian boy from the hamlet of Tuba near Yatta (Hebron), were injured when a group of Israeli settlers from the settlement of Ma'on beat them and took their schoolbags while en route to their school, with the IDF and police present, in nearby Twani.
- **9 April:** An Israeli settler was injured near 'Azzun (Qalqiliya) when Palestinians stoned his vehicle while passing on Road 55 near the village.
- **10 April:** An Israeli settler was injured near Jinsafut (Qalqiliya). The settler was injured by a bullet fired from a passing Palestinian vehicle while he was standing at a transport station.

Gaza:

- **4 April:** A 22 year-old Palestinian was killed and two farmers were injured by gunfire when four IDF tanks and one bulldozer moved from the border fence and entered 500 metres into the Palestinian area south of Beit Hanoun.
- **5 April:** A 17 year-old Palestinian girl died of wounds sustained during an IDF incursion in Jabalia Camp on 4 October 2004.
- **7 April:** A 20 year-old Palestinian (DFLP member) was killed when five IDF armoured vehicles moved from the border fence and entered 300 metres into the area between the Islamic Cemetery and the Abu Safiya area east of Jabalia. An IAF helicopter hovered overhead and fired five rockets at a group of Palestinians who had rushed to the area.
- **7 April:** A 26 year-old Palestinian man died of wounds sustained during an IDF incursion into Rafah on 22 April 2004.

Other incidents (not involving casualties):

- **4 April:** IDF vessels fired machineguns for fifteen minutes in the direction of Palestinian fishing boats west of Rafah. The fishing boats returned to the shore. No injuries or damage were reported.
- **4 April:** IDF fired a missile at a reported rocket-launch site east of Beit Hanoun. No injuries were reported.
- **5 April:** IDF vessels fired machineguns for fifteen minutes in the direction of Palestinian fishing boats west of Rafah. The fishing boats returned to the shore. No injuries or damage were reported.
- **10 April:** Palestinian gunmen opened fire at an IDF observation post near the border fence northeast of Beit Hanoun. The IDF responded with HMG fire for 10 minutes. No injuries were reported.
- **10 April:** IDF vessels opened fire at Palestinian fishing boats reportedly situated 4 nm from the shoreline. Three boats were reported damaged, one of which caught ablaze. There were no injuries reported.

2. Palestinian internal violence and other incidents²**Gaza Strip:**

- **4 April:** A Palestinian man was accidentally shot and injured during a celebration in Nuseirat Camp.
- **4 April:** Two Palestinian children were injured by shrapnel while they were playing with an UXO (anti-tank shell) that exploded in the Barazil area of Rafah.
- **6 April:** A Palestinian by-stander was injured during training at PRC military base in the Tal Az'etr area in Jabalia.
- **6 April:** Eleven Palestinians were injured during armed clashes erupted between Fatah and Hamas members in the Abasan area, Khan Younis.
- **6 April:** The Chairman of Palestinian Labourers Syndicate was injured when unknown gunmen opened fire and carjacked his vehicle, while he was travelling in Khan Younis. The motive behind the incident is unknown.
- **7 April:** One Palestinian was injured when a tunnel located under borderline between Egypt and Gaza opposite the Al Shouka area collapsed.
- **7 April:** Two members from Fateh and Hamas were injured during armed clashes between Hamas and Fatah in Beit Hanoun.
- **9 April:** A Palestinian women was shot and injured in the head in Beach Camp. Local sources state the motive behind the incident was due to a family dispute.
- **9 April:** A Palestinian man was injured by an old mine, a UXO, when he was farming his land on Mansoura Street in Gaza City.
- **9 April:** Five Palestinian men (aged 22, 27, 35, 37 and 51 years) were killed and three others injured when an internal armed dispute erupted between two local families in Khan Younis.
- **10 April:** A Fateh member was abducted and shot in his leg by unknown gunmen in Beit Hanoun. He was taken to hospital.
- **10 April:** A PA Police Officer was injured when he accidentally shot himself while handling his weapon in Nuseirat Camp.
- **10 April:** A 32 year-old PA Preventive Security member was shot and killed by unknown gunmen at Ma'en area in Khan Younis. The motive behind the incident is unknown.

West Bank:

- **9 April:** A 43 year-old Palestinian man was injured in Qalqiliya city by masked men. The motive behind the incident is unknown.
- **9 April:** Two Palestinian men were injured in Nablus during clashes between PA security forces and Palestinian militants.

Other incidents (not involving casualties):

² Casualties recorded in this section relate to Palestinian inter-factional fighting, family and community disputes and reckless use of weapons. Also reported in this section are casualties indirectly related to the conflict such as incidents involving Unexploded Ordnance (UXO), traffic accidents between Israeli and Palestinians in the oPt and deaths resulting from delay in receiving medical treatment at a checkpoint or during a military operation/curfew. These casualties are not recorded in the total in Section 1.

- **5 April:** 100 journalists marched from the PLC to the PA President's Office in Gaza City (Gaza Strip) in protest at the abduction of BBC journalist Alan Johnston. The Presidential Guard prevented the journalists from entering the compound and opened fire into the air. No injuries were reported.
- **10 April:** Jabalia municipality employees (Gaza Strip) staged a sit-in in front of the municipality to protest at the non-payment of PA salaries. The sit-in ended peacefully.

3. [Shelter and Property](#)

No damage or demolitions to Palestinian structures to report.

4 April: Israeli settlers from the settlement of Tel Rumeida, located in the H2 section of Hebron city (Hebron) set fire to the car of a Palestinian resident who lives in the vicinity of the settlement. This is the third time such an incident has taken place without any observable investigation from the Israeli police.

10 April: The IDF handed a demolition order to a house belonging to a Palestinian from Immatin village (Qalqiliya) for reportedly being built without a permit in Area C. The house is 360m² and under construction.

4. [Natural Resources](#)

Land levelling/Requisitions/Tree Uprooting³

Nablus Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Since 15 January 2007 the IDF have continued to level eight dunums of land near Huwwara checkpoint to expand the checkpoint. The land belongs to Palestinians from Burin village and was earlier requisitioned on 10 July 2005 (Military Order T/106/05).
- Since 17 September 2006 land levelling continues for a road barrier installed north of Road 505, east of Za'atara checkpoint.
- Since 15 June 2006 land levelling has continued north of Shave Shomeron settlement (west of Nablus) to install a fence.

Jenin Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Tubas Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Tulkarm Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Land levelling continues around Avnei Khefets and Enav settlements for the construction of a new fence.

Qalqiliya Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction: land levelling and construction work continue near Immatin village, between 'Azzun and Kafr Thulth and between Azzun and Kafr Laqif.

Salfit Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Ramallah / Al Bireh Governorate:

During the reporting period: Construction work of a new road between Rantis and Shuqba villages and parallel to bypass Road 465 is taking place and proceeding very quickly. This road is part of the Israeli plan to create alternative roads for Palestinians "fabric of life roads" will be used only by Palestinians. Road 465 will form part of the Barrier around Beit Arye and Ofarim settlements

During the reporting period: Construction work on a road between Beit Liqya and Beit 'Anan is continuing. This road is being constructed by the Israelis on Palestinian land as on of the “fabric of life roads” plan.

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction:
 - Construction continues between Kharbatha al Misbah and Bil'in and is in the final stages in the section between Beit 'Ur al Fauqa and At Tira villages.
 - The Barrier construction and what is called by the IDF the “special security arrangement” around Ateret settlement is complete. A fence now encircles the settlement on land earlier requisitioned by the IDF and belonging to Palestinians from Atara and Umm Safa villages.
 - The last section of the Barrier in Beit Sira village is complete between Beit Sira and Makkabim settlement. A 400-metre section between the village and Beit Nuba is under construction and a gate is being installed.
 - Following a decision by the Israeli High Court approving a new route of the Barrier in 'Abud, construction resumed parallel to bypass Road 465, as well as between 'Abud and Ofarim and Beit Arye settlements.

Jerusalem Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction:
 - Construction continues along the projected route in the Jerusalem governorate. Exceptions to this are northeast of Al 'Eizariya towards Ma'ale Adummim settlement. Construction continues along a 3 km stretch of the Barrier south of Ma'ale Adummim and Kedar but has stopped since 3 March 2006 pending a court case.
 - Construction near Ar Ram checkpoint between Dahiyat Al Bareed and Atarot is ongoing. Only one detour between the neighbourhoods of Ar Ram and Dahiyat Al Bareed remains possible due to the continued construction. Even pedestrians have been stopped going through these areas this week and clearly the Barrier will soon seal off this neighbourhood entirely from al Ram and the West Bank and encompassing it into Jerusalem. The once open area through the wall, is now a 'Gate' sealed off with a large iron structure. This week, the Iron Gate was closed most days. Vehicles are currently using a rough road a few metres beyond the gate. Construction of the Barrier in this neighbourhood is progressing at a rapid pace.
- The construction of a road barrier continues on Road 1, east of Az Za'ayem. Palestinians with Jerusalem ID cards driving to Jerusalem now have to drive south to Ma'ale Adummim and then return through Az Za'ayem checkpoint.
- Construction of an Israeli police station in E1 continues.
- The road between Anata and Al 'Eizariya is under construction (Road 70). Another road (Road 80) is planned that will link Abu Dis to Road 1 east of the planned Barrier around Ma'ale Adummim. The road will be open for Palestinians only.

Jericho Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Bethlehem Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction:
 - Construction continues next to Al Khadr Boys School along the eastern side of Road 60 adjacent to the school playground.
 - Land levelling continues in the section of Road 60 between the Palestinian village of Al Khadr and Al Nashshash (southern entrance of Bethlehem city).
 - Land levelling continues in the vicinity of the settlement of Har Gilo.
 - Land levelling continues in the vicinity of the settlement of Efrat, near Artas village.
 - Land levelling and digging for the construction of the tunnel near Al Khader village has accelerated. Levelling is also taking place along the western side of Road 60. Concrete partitions were placed during the

reporting period. Additional sections of the Barrier have been erected in this section during the reporting period.

- Paving continues on the side of Tunnels checkpoint to expand the site. Six lanes have been paved so far and four inspection cabins were installed.
- Work continues on the road leading to the Talita Khoumy School. A one-metre high road barrier was installed and land levelling has continued on both sides of the road.
- Land levelling continues for the construction of the new terminal next to Al Jab'a checkpoint.
- Construction work at Nu'man terminal is ongoing.
- Land levelling is on-going east of the Gush Etzion checkpoint.

Hebron Governorate:

8 April: The IDF closed down Halhul Bridge for an hour and a half and exploded an unidentified suspicious object. Traffic flow into and out of Hebron city was denied for the duration of the operation.

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction: construction continues west of Eshkolot settlement.
- Land levelling, including paving continues west of the checkpoint of Tarqumiya for a new commercial checkpoint.

Gaza Strip:

- **4 April:** Four IDF tanks and one bulldozer moved from the border fence and entered 500 metres into the Palestinian area south of Beit Hanoun under cover of gunfire to conduct land levelling operation.
- **5 April:** Four IDF tanks and two bulldozers moved from the border fence and entered 500 metres into the Palestinian area east of Beit Hanoun.
- **5 April:** Six IDF tanks and two bulldozers moved from the border fence and entered 300 metres into the Palestinian area east of Maghazi Camp to conduct a levelling and excavation operation.
- **6 April:** Four IDF tanks and four bulldozers moved from the border line and entered 500 metres into the Palestinian area south of Beit Hanoun to conduct a levelling and excavation operation. During the operation, an exchange of gunfire erupted for 30 minutes between a group of Palestinian gunmen and IDF soldiers. The Palestinian gunmen fired an RPG at the IDF tanks although no injuries were reported.

5. [Access and Movement for Civilians](#)

a) Curfew

No periods of curfew to report this week.

b) Access to education

4 April – 10 April: During the reporting period the IDF and Israeli Police came on time in the morning to escort Palestinian students to and from their elementary school in At Tuwani (south Hebron) to their homes in Tuba and Magyar Al Abid. The escort has been provided since 2004 to protect the students from attacks by Israeli settlers from the Ma'on settlement. On 8 April, two Palestinian girls, aged 11 and 12 years, and a 10 year-old Palestinian boy from the hamlet of Tuba, located near the hamlet of Twani, Yatta (Hebron), were injured when a group of Israeli settlers from Ma'on settlement beat them and took their schoolbags while en route to their school in At Tuwani, with the IDF and police present.

9 April: IDF soldiers manning Al Shuhada Street checkpoint (Hebron) prevented the headmistress of Qurduaba School from accessing the side gate of the checkpoint. She used an alternative route to get home.

7 April: A group of Palestinian gunmen broke into Beit Hanoun School (Gaza Strip) to take shooting positions on the rooftop during internal armed clashes before later vacating the premises.

c) Access to employment

Ongoing incidents:

- Since 1 April 2007, Palestinian workers and traders with valid permits to enter Israel from the West Bank have been prevented from accessing Israeli labour markets and their places of work. Palestinian workers from the Gaza Strip have been prevented from entering Israel for over one year (since 12 March 2006).
- In the West Bank, all Palestinians must apply directly to the DCL offices in the Jerusalem peripheries to obtain Israeli permits. The criteria for people to be eligible for an Israeli permit are similar for both workers and traders; a Palestinian should be above 35 years old, married with a child and with no security file. Criteria to apply for work permits inside Atarot industrial zone; a person should be above 21 years old, married with a child.
- Since 16 February 2007 to date: The PA health sector in the West Bank remains on strike. The governmental hospitals and the MoH clinics are on strike in the West Bank except for the emergency departments at the hospitals. The health clinics will open once every two weeks for vaccination and to distribute medicine for chronic diseases.

d) Closures/movement restrictions

Nablus Governorate:

4 April to date: Long queues and delays at Huwwara, Beit Iba, Zaatara and Al Badhan checkpoints.

8 April to date: The IDF prevented movement of Palestinian residents from Jenin governorate in and out of Nablus and south to other parts of the West Bank.

Ongoing incidents:

- Since 28 March 2007, the IDF closed Shave Shomron checkpoint for all Palestinians, ambulances, UN and international organisations.

Jenin Governorate:

Ongoing incidents:

- Since 30 August 2006, the IDF have allowed 40 commercial trucks (with a freight load of under two tonnes) to transport food products to Barta'a enclave. A list with the plate numbers of the trucks is present at the checkpoint. Other materials still require prior coordination.

Tubas Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Tulkarm Governorate:

4 April to date: Long queues and delays at 'Anabta and Kafriat tunnel checkpoints.

Qalqiliya Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Salfit Governorates:

4 April to date: Long queues and delays at Deir Ballut checkpoint.

Ongoing incidents:

- The IDF continues to close the gate at the northern entrance of Kafr ad Dik.

Ramallah / Al Bireh Governorate:

During the reporting period: Qalandiya checkpoint remained problematic throughout the reporting period with continuing delays observed during morning and evening rush hours and reported incidents involving IDF harassment towards Palestinians travelling through the pedestrian lane of the checkpoint.

Bethlehem Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Hebron Governorate:

No incidents to report.

Jerusalem Governorate:

During the reporting period: Commuters coming into Ramallah via Jaba' checkpoint experienced long delays during the morning and evening rush hours due to the regular and slow vehicle checks carried out by IDF soldiers manning the checkpoint.

Jericho Governorate/Jordan Valley:

5 April: During the evening rush hour, the IDF soldiers manning Hamra checkpoint denied access to Palestinian commercial trucks after requesting Israeli permits for the goods onboard. The liaison officer of Jericho intervened and clarified that permits are essential to transport goods used for manufactures and production such as fertilizers but not commercial goods. The trucks were allowed through after one hour delay.

Ongoing incidents:

- Since 9 January 2007, Bisan checkpoint, north of Tubas, has been open for Palestinian merchants from the Jordan Valley and Jericho to export their agricultural produce into Israel using a back-to-back system. Palestinians from the West Bank in possession of BMC cards (trader permits) in addition to an Israeli permit, are allowed through this checkpoint into Israel. Palestinians working for international organisations continue to be prohibited from using Bisan checkpoint.
- Since 14 September 2006, the IDF announced that only Palestinians with Jericho residency and Jerusalem ID and residents of Bethlehem and Hebron holders would be able to exit via the Jericho DCO checkpoint, forcing all others to either request a permit or travel on the Al Mu'arrajat old road to reach the rest of the West Bank. Palestinians employed by international organisations, humanitarian workers and residents of Abu Dis, Ash Sheikh Sa'd, Al 'Eizariya, Az Za'ayyem and As Sawahira village are allowed to exit Jericho via the DCO checkpoint.

Gaza Strip

During the reporting period:

- Karni was open on all scheduled opening days (Karni is scheduled to close on Saturdays). On 8 April the crossing was open for shorter hours.
- Erez crossing was partially open for the movement of diplomats, international humanitarian workers, critical medical cases throughout the week:
 - o Open all week (shortened hours) for internationals (non-diplomats require prior coordination with the IDF which is being decided on a case-by-case basis)
 - o Closed for all Palestinians except critical medical cases/humanitarian cases throughout the week.
 - o The crossing remains closed since 12 March 2006 for Palestinian workers. The crossing was also closed for Palestinian traders throughout the reporting period.
- Rafah crossing was open on 4, 5, 6 and 10 April allowing a total of 3,261 people to exit and 3,379 people to enter the Gaza Strip.
- Nahal Oz energy pipelines were open five out of six scheduled opening days (the pipelines are scheduled to be closed on Saturdays and also remained closed on 9 April). On 8 April the crossing was open shorter hours.
- Sufa crossing was closed all week due to Israeli security concerns.
- Kerem Shalom was open on 4, 5 and 8 April.
- Gaza fishermen are permitted to fish up to six nautical miles off the coastline.

Ongoing incidents:

- Following Israel's unilateral disengagement from the Gaza Strip in September 2005, the IDF announced that Palestinians should keep a distance of at least 150 metres from the perimeter fence along the eastern and northern borders of the Gaza Strip
- On 28 December 2005, the IDF declared the former northern settlement bloc to be a 'no-go' zone. Officially, entry into the area for the 250 residents and international organisations requires prior coordination with the IDF, however this is not enforced.

Taybeh	An Israeli private company has the responsibility of controlling the checkpoint. The back-to-back system has been operational from 8am to 5pm Sunday to Thursday and 8am to 12pm on Fridays.
Nablus	
Awarta checkpoint Main commercial checkpoint in Nablus since July 2003.	Open from 6am to 5pm, Sunday to Thursday, Friday from 6am to 2pm and closed on Saturday. Commercial trucks need permits to pass the checkpoint.
Qusin Checkpoint (NEW)	Open from 7:00 am to 7:00 pm for Palestinian plated commercial trucks with permits. The checkpoint is on the road leading to road 60/55 to Tulkarm, Qalqiliya and the rest of the West Bank south of Nablus. On 10 March to date closed and commercial trucks diverted to Beit Iba checkpoint.
Jenin	
Al Jalama Main commercial check point.	Open between 7am to 4pm Sunday to Thursday and 7am to 12pm on Fridays.
Ramallah/Al Bireh	
Beituniya Back-to-back checkpoint	Officially open between 7am to 5pm Sunday to Thursday, 7am to 1pm on Fridays and closed Saturdays and Jewish holidays. Open for commercial goods and a back-to-back system is in operation. Only Palestinians holding Jerusalem IDs and driving Israeli yellow-plated trucks are allowed to pass through this checkpoint without using the back-to-back system. Palestinians holding Israeli IDs and driving Israeli yellow-plated trucks are allowed through without using the back –to-back system only if bill lading stipulates Kafr 'Aqab and /or Sameeramees offloading destination. This checkpoint is not open for private cars or pedestrians. UN staff are allowed through the checkpoint following prior coordination with the Israeli DCL.
Gaza Strip	
Sufa	Sufa crossing was closed all week due to Israeli security concerns.
Karni	Karni was open on all scheduled opening days (Karni is scheduled to close on Saturdays). On 8 April the crossing was open for shorter hours.

Kerem Shalom	Kerem Shalom open on 4, 5 and 8 April.
Nahal Oz Energy Pipelines	Nahal Oz crossing was open on five out of the six scheduled opening days (the crossing is scheduled to close on Saturdays), The pipelines closed early on 8 April and remained closed on 9 April due to the Jewish Passover holiday.

Method and Sources

The information used to compile these Briefing Notes comes from a range of sources with a field presence in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip. The accuracy of the reported information is ensured through the corroboration of reports by two additional sources. Typically, the OCHA Field Coordination Unit (FCU) receives an initial incident report from a source, which is verified through visits to the incident site in addition to further corroboration with a third source, such as an NGO. In addition, OCHA FCU collects military orders as documentary evidence and provides information on incidents witnessed in person.

In the interests of timeliness and readability, the sources are not listed for each incident within the texts of the report. Listed below are the sources relied upon each week in compiling this Briefing:
