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## Protection of Civilians Weekly Report

### 15 – 21 August 2007

#### Of note this week

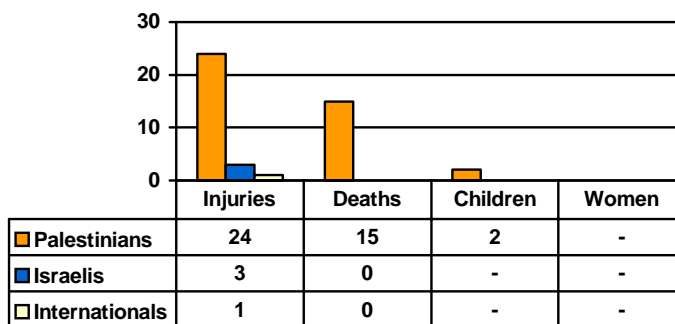
##### **Gaza Strip:**

- The IDF killed 12 Palestinians and injured eight others. Amongst those killed are six Hamas members, three Islamic Jihad members, two children, and one 18-year-old Palestinian.
- IDF bulldozers levelled agricultural land east of Al Bureij Camp and in Al Fukhari area.
- 16 Qassam rockets and 48 mortar shells were fired towards Israel, including four Qassams and two mortars that detonated prematurely in the Palestinian area. Three IAF strikes were carried out that lead to the death of three Islamic Jihad members and the injury of one Hamas member.
- On 16 and 17 August, the IDF closed Nahal Oz fuel pipelines (the only crossing point for petrol, diesel and cooking gas) due to a security alert. Between 19 and 21 August, fuel supplies for the electricity plant were suspended due to some concerns by the European Commission. This resulted in daily power cuts and malfunctioning of water pumps that affected all of Gaza's 1.4 million residents.

##### **West Bank:**

- The IDF killed three Palestinians (Jenin and Nablus) and injured 16 others throughout the West Bank. Two IDF soldiers were injured during search campaigns in Balata Camp on 16 and 19 August (Nablus). One Irish peace activist was injured by the IDF during the weekly demonstration against the Barrier in Al Walaja (Bethlehem).
- **15 August:** The IDF began leveling land in Al Walaja village to prepare for the construction of the Barrier on village lands located in the vicinity of Har Gilo settlement. As a result, about 200 trees were uprooted during the reporting period.
- Out of the eight Palestinians arrested in Bethlehem Governorate this week, five were previously detained at PA prison being suspected of membership in an Executive Support Force (ESF) core group. They were released from PA prisons on 16 August and were detained by the IDF on 18 August.
- 112 flying checkpoints, 108 IDF search campaigns, and 74 arrests were reported.

## 1. Physical Protection – conflict related casualties

### Gaza Strip:

- **15 August:** An Israeli woman was injured as a result of Palestinian mortar shelling towards Erez crossing from an area north of Beit Hanoun (North Gaza).
- **18 August:** An 18-year-old Palestinian was killed and two others were arrested when IDF soldiers stationed at the border fence northeast of Bureij Camp opened fire in the direction of three Palestinians who approached the fence in an apparent attempt to cross into Israel (Central Gaza).
- **20 August:** Two Palestinians (members of Islamic Jihad) were injured when IDF soldiers stationed at the border fence fired one tank shell towards them in response to the firing of Qassam from an area north of Beit Hanoun towards Sderot (North Gaza).
- **20 August:** Six Palestinians (members of Hamas), aged 22(3), 23, 25 and 27 years, were killed and three others were injured when the IDF stationed at the borderline east of Al Bureij Camp fired a surface-to-surface missile targeting a jeep situated next to a Hamas military base (Central Gaza).
- **21 August:** Three Palestinians (members of Islamic Jihad), aged 19, 20 and 23 years, were killed when an IAF helicopter fired a rocket targeting a vehicle carrying suspected militants and travelling east of Al Qarara (Khan Younis).
- **21 August:** Two Palestinian children (aged 9 and 12 years) were killed and a 13-year-old boy was injured when IDF soldiers stationed at the border line north of Beit Hanoun fired a surface-to-surface missile at a group of children who were allegedly present near a rocket launcher (North Gaza).
- **21 August:** A 40-year-old Palestinian man was injured when IDF soldiers guarding the border fence east of Jabalia fired Machine Guns (MGs) in the direction of a group of people near the fence (North Gaza).
- **21 August:** A 27-year-old Palestinian (member of Hamas) was injured when an IAF helicopter fired a rocket targeting an ESF military base located at the former Morag settlement in Rafah (Rafah).

### Other incidents (not involving casualties/damage):

- **17 August:** An IAF helicopter fired a rocket at a group of Islamic Jihad members who were reportedly attempting to launch rockets from the Sudaniya area northwest of Beit Lahiya towards Sderot. The missile hit the rocket launcher. No injuries were reported.

### West Bank:

- **16 August:** One IDF soldier was injured in Balata Camp during an IDF search campaign when an explosive device was detonated near the IDF patrol (Nablus).
- **17 August:** Two Palestinian men (aged 19 and 25 years) were killed and three others (aged 16 and 21(2) years) were injured by live ammunition in Kafr Dan during an exchange of fire between the IDF and armed Palestinians (Jenin).
- **17 August:** One Palestinian was injured upon being physically assaulted by the Israeli Border Police during a demonstration held by Palestinian, international and Israeli activists against the Barrier constructed in Bil'in village. Several cases of tear gas inhalation were also reported (Ramallah).
- **17 August:** A Palestinian man (in his mid 30s) and an Irish peace activist (in his mid 40s) were physically assaulted and injured when IDF soldiers used force to disperse a weekly demonstration against the Barrier in the village of Al Walaja (Bethlehem).
- **18 August:** A 32-year-old Palestinian man from the town of Idhna was physically assaulted and injured by IDF soldiers while searching his home (Hebron).
- **18 August:** A woman and her three children suffered tear-gas inhalation in Qusin village and were **transported to hospital** in Nablus after the IDF threw gas canisters near their house during a search and arrest campaign in the village (Nablus).
- **18 August:** A 13-year-old Palestinian boy from Tayasir was injured by unexploded ordnance (UXO) (Tubas).
- **18 August:** A 35-year-old Palestinian woman was injured in Camp No.1 by shrapnel when the IDF opened fire during a search campaign in the Camp (Nablus).
- **19 August:** A 34-year-old Palestinian man from Kafr Qalil was injured during an exchange of fire with the IDF. Four Palestinians were arrested during the operation, including the injured person.
- **19 August:** One IDF soldier was injured in Balata Camp during a search campaign following an exchange of fire between the IDF and armed Palestinians (Nablus).
- **20 August:** Three Palestinian boys (aged 15, 16 and 17 years) were injured by rubber-coated metal bullets in Camp No.1 during an IDF military operation (Nablus).

- **21 August:** A 38-year-old Palestinian man from Camp No.1 was killed during an exchange of fire with the IDF (Nablus).

Other incidents (not involving casualties/damage):

- **15 August:** At 0230 hours, the IDF conducted a search operation in Qalandiya refugee camp. Palestinians stoned IDF soldiers and the IDF responded with rubber-coated metal bullets. The IDF arrested one Palestinian.
- **16 August:** The IDF issued a military decree to place so-called “technological equipment” (surveillance cameras) on a number of houses in the area between Tel Rumeida and the Ibrahim Mosque in the H2 area of the Hebron City (Hebron).
- **17 August:** The IDF evacuated dozens of Israeli settlers from the dismantled Homesh settlement after the settlers had entered the settlement area in the early morning hours.
- **17 August:** Palestinians and international peace activists held a peaceful demonstration near the entrance of Sarra village (at the intersection between the entrance and Road 55) in protest against its closure by the IDF since the beginning of the Intifada (Nablus).
- **19 August:** IDF soldiers stopped a Palestinian Police vehicle that was accompanying the Governor of Hebron in Al Hawouz Al Thani neighbourhood, located in the H1 area of Hebron City, and confiscated the weapons of the policemen before allowing the motorcade to proceed (Hebron).

## 2. Physical Protection - other incidents involving casualties<sup>2</sup>

### **Gaza Strip:**

- **13 August:** A 37-year-old Palestinian woman was shot and killed by her brother in Twam area west of Jabaliya. The incident is reportedly a family honour crime (North Gaza).
- **16 August:** Three Palestinians (members of Hamas) were injured when the RPG shells they were using exploded prematurely in Khan Younis (Khan Younis).
- **17 August:** A 10-year-old boy was injured when a Qassam rocket that was fired from Beit Hanoun towards Sderot instead hit a Palestinian home northeast of Beit Hanoun. The rocket damaged the house (North Gaza).
- **18 August:** Three Palestinians were injured during an armed family dispute between local family members that escalated into an exchange of gunfire (Khan Younis).
- **19 August:** A 44-year-old Palestinian man was found shot and killed at the former Nitsarim settlement. There is no information available about the cause of the death (Central Gaza).
- **19 August:** A 19-year-old Palestinian was killed and a bystander was injured when armed members from a local family opened fire at a moving vehicle in Jabalia Camp. The motive reportedly relates to an ongoing family dispute (North Gaza).
- **19 August:** Three Palestinians (aged 22(2) and 30) were injured unintentionally by Palestinian fire during an incursion by an IDF undercover unit into Al Fukhari area east of Khan Younis. At 0300 hours, the IDF withdrew to the border fence (Khan Younis).
- **20 August:** A 19-year-old Palestinian (member of Islamic Jihad) was injured while he was making a Qassam rocket in Beit Hanoun (North Gaza).
- **21 August:** An 18-year-old boy was injured while making a homemade bomb in Bureij Camp (Central Gaza).
- **21 August:** An 11-year-old boy was injured by shrapnel when he was tampering with a homemade bomb in Rafah (Rafah).

Other incidents (not involving casualties):

- **16 August:** The roads around the Sabra area opened after Hamas and the Doghmosh family reached an agreement to hand over wanted Doghmosh family members and stolen vehicles (Gaza).
- **17 August:** Hamas organised a cleaning campaign in Gaza City in response to the municipality labourers’ strike, which resulted in the accumulation of uncollected garbage in the streets of Gaza and Khan Younis cities. Dozens of volunteers were seen in the streets removing garbage (Gaza).
- **19 August:** Khan Younis employees staged a sit-in at the municipality to protest the non-payment of their salaries. The sit-in ended peacefully (Khan Younis).

<sup>2</sup> Casualties recorded in this section relate to Palestinian inter-factional fighting, family and community disputes, reckless use of weapons, and disputed incidents. Also reported in this section are casualties indirectly related to the conflict such as incidents involving Unexploded Ordnance (UXO), traffic accidents between Israeli and Palestinians in the oPt and deaths resulting from delay in receiving medical treatment at a checkpoint or during a military operation/curfew. These casualties are not recorded in the total in Section 1.

- **21 August:** The ESF took over the management of the Labourers Association in Rafah, which had formerly been headed by Fatah (Rafah).

#### West Bank:

No incidents to report.

#### Inter-factional violence

Other incidents (not involving casualties):

- **16 August:** The Minister of Transportation closed the licensing department in Nablus City until further notice after an attempt by Palestinian gunmen to force an employee to sign forged documents.

### 3. Shelter and Property

- **15 August:** At 1700 hours, IDF soldiers and the Israeli Border Police demolished a Palestinian house in Silwan for lack of a building permit (Jerusalem).
- **17 August:** A Palestinian house was damaged when it was hit by a Qassam rocket; the rocket was fired from Beit Hanoun towards Sderot but detonated prematurely in the Palestinian area and hit the house northeast of Beit Hanoun (North Gaza).
- **19 August:** IDF soldiers patrolling Ras Al Aroud neighbourhood in the town of Sa'ir opened fire at stone-throwing Palestinians. Bullets hit the electric generator feeding electricity to the neighbourhood and the electricity was cut off for a period of four hours that affected households (with an estimated population of 6000) in the area stretching from Ras Al Aroud to the centre of Sa'ir (Hebron).

#### Internal Violence Incidents Affecting Shelter and Property:

- 19 August: Unknown armed men stormed Fatah's office in Deir El Balah and confiscated computers and documents (Central Gaza).

### 4. Natural Resources

#### Land levelling/Requisitions/Tree Uprooting<sup>3</sup>

##### Nablus Governorate:

**16 August:** 130 olive trees were burnt when fire was set to five dunums of land belonging to farmers from Deir al Hatab (Nablus). It is not known who was responsible for the fire.

Ongoing incident:

- **8 August to date:** The IDF continues construction work to upgrade the lanes at Beit Iba checkpoint.
- **15 January to date:** The IDF continues to level eight dunums of land near Huwwara checkpoint to expand the checkpoint. The land belongs to Palestinians from Burin village and was requisitioned on 10 July 2005 (Military Order T/106/05).

##### Jenin Governorate:

No incidents to report.

##### Tubas Governorate:

No incidents to report.

**Tulkarm Governorate:**

## Ongoing incident:

- Land levelling continues around Avne Hefez and Enav settlements for the construction of a new fence.

**Qalqiliya Governorate:**

**19 August:** Israeli settlers from Gil'ad farm outpost (Nablus) set fire to 140 olive trees belonging to farmers from Jit village (Qalqiliya) and Tell village (Nablus).

## Ongoing incident:

- **13 August to date:** The IDF continues to carry out land leveling to build a military road connecting Qedumim settlement to road 55, in accordance with military requisition order T/15/07. The land belongs to farmers from Kafr Qaddum village.
- Barrier construction: land levelling and construction work continue near Immatin village, between 'Azzun and Kafr Thulth, and between 'Azzun and Kafr Laqif.

**Salfit Governorate:**

No incidents to report.

**Ramallah / Al Bireh Governorate:**

## Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction:
  - Barrier construction on Palestinian land extending between Rantis (northwest of Ramallah governorate) and Beit Nuba (southwest of Ramallah governorate) is complete, except for Al Midya-Ni'lin section.
  - Barrier construction between Al Midya and Ni'lin has been planned but is pending a decision by the Israeli High Court of Justice based on appeals submitted by Ni'lin village residents and Hashmon'im settlers (each side is demanding that the barrier be pushed closer to the other side).
  - Construction continues on 'Abud land to encircle Beit Arye and Ofarim settlements as part of the extension of the "Ariel finger." Construction is taking place around the two settlements and parallel to bypass Road 564. The Barrier will isolate 3,800 dunums of the village land.
- Construction of three "fabric of life" roads, which is part of an Israeli plan to build alternative roads for Palestinians *in lieu* of the main roads that have become closed due to closures and Barrier construction:
  - Construction continues at a fast pace of a new road between Rantis and Shuqba, parallel to bypass Road 465.
  - Construction continues of a road between Beit Liqya and Beit 'Anan.
  - Construction continues of a road between Beit 'Ur al Fauqa and Tira via an underpass under Road 443.
  - Land levelling continues in order to construct a road between Beit Ur at Tahta and Beituniya.

**Jerusalem Governorate:**

## Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction:
  - Construction continues along the projected route in the Jerusalem governorate. Exceptions to this are northeast of Al 'Eizariya towards Ma'ale Adummim settlement. Construction has been stopped along a 3 km stretch of the Barrier south of Ma'ale Adummim and Kedar since 3 March 2006 pending a court case.
  - Construction near Ar Ram checkpoint between Dahiyat Al Bareed and Atarot is complete. One detour route between the neighbourhoods of Ar Ram and Dahiyat Al Bareed remains possible but the Barrier will soon seal off this neighbourhood entirely from Ar Ram and the West Bank. This week, the iron gate between Ar Ram and Dahiyat Al Bareed was closed on most days to vehicular traffic and ajar for pedestrian passage only, as additional construction and infrastructure work was carried out on the remaining parts of the Barrier in Dahiyat al Bareed. It is planned that the gate will be used by Israeli security patrol vehicles and will not be open for humanitarian cases in the future.
  - The construction of a road barrier continues on Road 1 east of Az Za'ayem.
- Construction of an Israeli police station (two large buildings) in E1 is ongoing. E1, or East 1, is an area north of Ma'ale Adummim and Road 1. Major infrastructure

work is being carried out on the hill around the two buildings in preparation for building the roads that will lead to the police station.

- The road between Anata and Al 'Eizariya is under construction (Road 70). Another road (Road 80) is planned that will link Abu Dis to Road 1 east of the planned Barrier around Ma'ale Adummim. The road will be open for Palestinians only and is part of the "fabric of life" roads planned by the Israeli authorities.

#### **Jericho Governorate:**

No incidents to report.

#### **Bethlehem Governorate:**

**15 August:** The IDF began leveling land in Al Walaja village as part of an initial stage to construct the Barrier on village lands located in the vicinity of Har Gilo settlement. As a result, about 200 trees were uprooted during the reporting period.

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction:
  - Construction continues next to Al Khadr Boys School along the eastern side of Road 60 adjacent to the school playground.
  - Land levelling continues in the section of Road 60 between the Palestinian village of Al Khadr and Al Nashshash (southern entrance of Bethlehem City). Additional lengths of the Barrier have been erected in this section during the reporting period.
  - Land levelling and asphaltting continues west of Wadi Rahhal village and near the settlement of Efrata for the construction of the Barrier.
  - Sections of the Barrier have been placed in the vicinity of Har Gilo settlement.
- The expanded Tunnels checkpoint site is operational. Extensive land levelling has taken place on both sides of the road leading to Beit Jala at the junction with Road 60.
- Land levelling and digging for the construction of the underpass near Al Khadr village has continued. The initial construction of the underpass is complete but land levelling is currently being carried out to construct the underpass lanes.
- Land levelling is also taking place along the western side of Road 60 leading to the western villages.
- Land levelling continues for the construction of the new terminal next to Al Jab'a checkpoint.
- Construction work at Nu'man terminal is ongoing.
- Land levelling is on-going east of the Gush Etzion checkpoint.

#### **Hebron Governorate:**

Ongoing incidents:

- Barrier construction: construction continues west of Eshkolot settlement.
- Land levelling, including paving continues west of the checkpoint of Tarqumiya for a new commercial checkpoint.

#### **Gaza Strip:**

- **19 August:** An IDF undercover unit entered 600 meters into the Fukhari area east of Khan Younis to conduct a levelling and excavation operation. At 0300 hours, the IDF withdrew to the border fence (Khan Younis).
- **20 August:** Three IDF tanks and two bulldozers entered 200 meters into the area east of Al Bureij Camp to conduct a levelling and excavating operation. IDF tanks and two bulldozers withdrew to the borderline (Central Gaza).

## **5. Access and Movement for Civilians**

### **a) Incidents of curfews**

Ongoing incidents:

- **17 May to date:** Palestinians living in Gaza Strip areas (north east of Beit Hanoun and north, and northwest of Beit Lahiya) have maintained a self-imposed curfew after dark due to IDF military operations.

### **b) Access to education**

No incidents to report.

**c) Access to employment**

- **Throughout the week**, Palestinian workers from the Governorate of Hebron holding valid permits to work in Israel were obliged to stay overnight in front of the Meitar checkpoint, located south of the town of Adh Dhahiriya (Hebron), in order to reach their workplaces inside Israel. This checkpoint is the only checkpoint in the Governorate of Hebron that can be used by Palestinian workers to reach their work places inside Israel. It is manned by the Israeli Border Police and checks are conducted using palm identification. Similarly, Palestinian workers from the Governorate of Bethlehem holding valid work permits were obliged to stay overnight at Gilo checkpoint in order to cross and reach their work places inside Israel.

Ongoing incidents:

- Since 12 March 2006, Palestinian workers from the Gaza Strip have been prevented from entering Israel.
- In the West Bank, all Palestinians must apply to the DCL offices in the Jerusalem peripheries to obtain Israeli permits. The criteria for people to be eligible for an Israeli permit are similar for both workers and traders; a Palestinian should be above 35 years of age, married with at least one child, and with no security file.

**d) Closures/movement restrictions****Nablus Governorate:**

**18 August:** The IDF closed Huwwara checkpoint for two hours after they allegedly arrested one Palestinian carrying home made bombs.

Ongoing incidents:

- **28 March to date:** The IDF continues to close Shave Shomron checkpoint (Nablus) for all Palestinians, ambulances, UN and international organisations.

**Jenin Governorate:**

Ongoing incidents:

- **30 August 2006 to date:** The IDF have continued to allow 40 commercial trucks (with a freight load of under two tonnes) to transport food products to Barta'a enclave. A list with the plate numbers of the trucks is present at the checkpoint. Other materials require prior coordination.

**Tubas Governorate:**

No incidents to report.

**Tulkarm Governorate:**

**18 August:** The IDF closed 'Anabta and Kafriat tunnel checkpoints for one hour due to a security alert and prevented Palestinians from exiting Tulkarm City.

Ongoing incidents:

- **24 May to date:** The IDF continues to close the dirt road connecting Dhinnaba to Izbat abu Khameish with two earth mounds.

**Qalqiliya Governorate:**

**20 August:** The IDF closed the main northern entrance to 'Azzun village with concrete blocks (Qalqiliya).

Ongoing incidents:

- **18 May to date:** The IDF continues to close the road connecting Izbat at Tabib with 'Azzun and 'Asla villages with an earth mound.
- **13 July to date:** The IDF soldiers positioned at the flying checkpoint placed at the eastern entrance of Qalqiliya City (DCO) continue to prevent Arab Israelis to enter Qalqiliya City.

**Salfit Governorate:**

Ongoing incidents:

- The IDF continues to close the gate at the northern entrance of Kafr ad Dik.

**Ramallah / Al Bireh Governorate:**

**17, 18, 19 August:** Long delays of up to 30 minutes were reported at Atara checkpoint.

Ongoing incidents:

- **1 July to date** The Road gate of At Tira (Ramallah) opens three times a day for half an hour each time. The gate will be used by the residents travelling in Palestinian-plated taxis to enter/exit the village—only 11 Palestinian taxis were permitted to cross and travel on Road 443.

**Jerusalem Governorate:**

**During the reporting period:** It is reported that the flying checkpoint near the Atarot industrial area has become manned on a daily basis, indicating that it is being transformed into a permanent checkpoint.

**Jericho Governorate/Jordan Valley:**

Ongoing incidents:

- **14 September 2006 to date:** The IDF announced that only Palestinians with Jericho residency, Jerusalem ID-holders, and residents of Bethlehem and Hebron, would be able to exit via the Jericho DCO checkpoint, forcing all others to either request a permit or to travel on the Al Mu'arrajat old road to reach the rest of the West Bank. Palestinians employed by international organisations, humanitarian workers and residents of Abu Dis, Ash Sheikh Sa'd, Al 'Eizariya, Az Za'ayem and As Sawahira village are allowed to exit Jericho via the DCO checkpoint.
- **9 January to date:** Bisan checkpoint has been open for Palestinian merchants from the Jordan Valley and Jericho to export their agricultural produce into Israel using a back-to-back system. Palestinians from the West Bank in possession of BMC cards (trader permits) in addition to an Israeli permit, are allowed through this checkpoint into Israel. Palestinians working for international organisations continue to be prohibited from using Bisan checkpoint.
- **26 April to date:** Access of Palestinians to the Jordan Valley continued at the improved level previously reported. Movement from the West Bank continues to be controlled through the four main checkpoints: Tayasir, Hamra, Ma'ale Efraim and Yitav. However, a personal permit is no longer required to enter the Jordan Valley for West Bank residents. Access is only possible with public transportation as West Bank private vehicles continue to be prohibited from entering the Jordan Valley.

**Bethlehem Governorate:**

**15 August:** IDF soldiers prevented a World Vision international project from being implemented in the village of Nahalin. The project called for the rehabilitation of 70 dunums in the village (Bethlehem).

**Hebron Governorate:**

No incidents to report.

**Gaza Strip**

Functioning of Gaza crossing points:

- Erez was open all week for senior Palestinian businessmen as well as the movement of diplomats, international humanitarian workers, and critical medical cases with special coordination arrangements. However, since 4 July and for the first time since 12 June, a very limited number of senior Palestinian businessmen were permitted to cross Erez towards Israel and the West Bank. (Appendix for daily log of movement is based on estimated figures due to the absence of staff at the Palestinian DCL at the present time).
- Rafah crossing was closed this week
- Karni crossing: the conveyor belt operated for one day to transfer wheat into Gaza (21 August) due to shortages on the local market. No trucks were permitted to cross. Karni has been closed since 12 June. Between 17 May and 12 June, the crossing's operating hours were shortened from 13.5 to 9 so it has in general it had been closed before dusk (around 1800 hours).
- Sufa crossing was open on all scheduled operating days this week for the crossing of commercial goods and humanitarian aid.
- Kerem Shalom was open for five days this week (15, 16, 19, 20 and 21 August) for the crossing of commercial goods and humanitarian aid provided by international aid organizations.
- Nahal Oz energy pipelines were open on five scheduled operating days.
- Gaza fishermen are permitted to fish up to six nautical miles off the coastline.

Ongoing incidents:

- Following Israel's unilateral disengagement from the Gaza Strip in September 2005, the IDF announced that Palestinians should keep a distance of at least 150 metres from the perimeter fence along the eastern and northern borders of the Gaza Strip.



- On 28 December 2005, the IDF declared the former northern settlement bloc to be a “no-go” zone. Officially, entry into the area for the 250 residents and international organisations requires prior coordination with the IDF. Since 17 May, IDF presence in this area has been enforcing this ban.
- **17 May to date:** Palestinian farmers have been unable to reach their farms in the areas east and north Beit Hanoun and north and northwest of Beit Lahia due to ongoing IDF military activities. Palestinian farmers have also been unable to reach farms located east of Al Bureij Camp and east of Khan Younis due to intermittent military operations by the IDF. In total, at least 200 dunums planted with different crops are currently inaccessible since IDF soldiers regularly open fire towards the area. There is a fear that if access obstruction continues more than 1,000 tonnes of potatoes, water melons and onions will rot.

<b>Kafriat</b>	Open 24 hours. It is divided into three parts: one that controls movement to and from Tulkarm town; one that controls movement to Israel; and one that controls movement to and from Jbara.
<b>Kafriat Tunnel / Ar Ras</b>	The checkpoint is controlling all traffic heading south from Tulkarm including residents of Jenin.
<b>'Anabta</b>	Located at the eastern entrance of Tulkarm on Road 57.
<b>Qalqiliya:</b>	
<b>Jaljoulia</b>	Open 24 hours. Access is only granted to holders of permits to enter Israel and residents of Ras Tira, Ad Dab'a, Wadi Ar Rasha, Ramadin and Arab Abu Farda. Ambulances from Qalqiliya town to these five villages need prior coordination with DCL. Only vehicles leaving the West Bank are subject to security checks.

<b>Settlers' Checkpoint – Efrata</b> <i>Southern entrance to settlement</i>	Open 24 hours. Checkpoint manned by Israeli settlers with movement beyond it restricted for Palestinians.
<b>Gush Etzion</b> <i>On Road 60, at Etzion turn</i>	Open 24 hours. IDF soldiers checking northbound vehicles. Private Palestinian plated cars can pass.
<b>Wadi Fukin</b> <i>Crossing to Israel on Road 375, Green Line</i>	Open 24 hours for Israelis and staff of international organisations.
<b>Al Jab'a</b> <i>Crossing to Israel on Road 367, Green Line</i>	Open 24 hours for Israelis and staff of international organisations. Land levelling is ongoing to enlarge the checkpoint.
<b>Ein Gedi</b> <i>On Road 90, along Dead Sea</i>	Open 24 hours; restricted for Palestinian movement.
<b>Hebron :</b>	
<b>Beit Awwa, Partial CP</b> <i>At entrance to Negohot settlement, on Road 354</i>	Crossing along Road 354. Manned by the Israeli Border Police. It is currently open 24 hours with occasional ID checks. However, it has been reported by MSF (Médecins Sans Frontiers/Doctors Without Borders) that thorough checks and maltreatment have been experienced by staff especially while trying to reach Palestinian

	families living along the road leading to the settlement of Negohot.
<b>Tarqumiya</b> <i>Entrance for commercial goods (back-to-back), west of Hebron on Road 35 for both Hebron and Bethlehem governorates</i>	Workers are usually allowed to cross from 0500 to 1700 hours. The back-to-back section is open from 0700 to 1700 hours; goods are moving across smoothly and all cargo is checked by the IDF Military Police. 'Family visits' coordinated by ICRC for Palestinians detained in Israel were carried out as normal through this checkpoint.
<b>Meitar</b> <i>Crossing to Israeli. Road 60 on the Green Line</i>	Manned by the Israeli Border Police and open between 0500 and 1900 hours. Checks are conducted using palm identification. Palestinian workers with valid permits are permitted to cross. However, during the current reporting period, it was reported that Palestinian workers holding valid permits to work in Israel were camping overnight at the checkpoint to ensure for themselves a reasonable chance of accessing Israel.
<b>Shani</b> <i>At turn for Shani settlement on Road 317</i>	Manned by the IDF. Only Israeli plated cars are allowed to travel through it. Palestinian workers cannot use the checkpoint to access Israel.
<b>Beit Yatir</b> <i>On Road 316, at the turn for Imneizel</i>	Open 24 hours and manned by the IDF. The checkpoint is restricting the movement of Palestinians living south of it next to the settlement of Beit Yatir. The Terminal is operational and the checkpoint was pushed back behind the roundabout. Currently Palestinians living in the nearby village of Imneizil can access their village without having to cross the checkpoint.
<b>Prayers Road, H2</b> <i>Access to area of Ibrahim Mosque</i>	Closed to Palestinians. During the reporting period, both Israeli settlers and IDF soldiers prevented Palestinian residents from accessing this road.
<b>Shohada street, H2</b> <i>Western entrance to Shohada street</i>	Open to Palestinians living beyond it and in the Tel Rumeida area. Access possible only on foot. Palestinians and internationals have to go through a mobile metal detector.
<b>Ibrahimi Mosque, H2</b> <i>Access to the Mosque</i>	Worshippers and visitors are searched upon entry. Residents living in the vicinity of the Mosque must hold a special permit to gain access to their homes. On 18 August, Israeli security forces manning the checkpoint have reportedly asked one Palestinian woman to lift her <i>Jilbab</i> (a traditional Islamic dress) in order to physically search her before allowing her to enter the mosque.
<b>Bab Al Baladiyye , H2</b> <i>Next to settlement of Beit Romano</i>	The checkpoint is closed to Palestinians heading in the direction of Shohada Street and a new gate has been installed across the road blocking physical access towards it.
<b>Qarantina, H2</b> <i>Junction with Shohada Street</i>	Closed to Palestinians. Entry point for Palestinian fire trucks and ambulances. No longer allowed for the use of international humanitarian organisations, though the TIPH have reported being able to use it.
<b>Bab Al-Khan, H2</b> <i>Entrance to Avraham Avinu</i>	Closed to Palestinians heading in the direction of Shohada Street and north toward the market.
<b>Tel Rumeida, H2</b> <i>Beginning of street leading to settlement</i>	Open only to Palestinians travelling on foot living between the checkpoint and the settlement. A military order was issued on 17 July 2006 that declared the area beyond the checkpoint as a "Closed Area" barring the entry of anyone beyond the checkpoint except Israeli citizens, IDF and Israeli Police or those with an IDF-issued permit.
<b>Al Kasaba, H2</b> <i>Exit from the Kasaba, old city (Tomb of the Patriarchs)</i>	Permanent checkpoint which filters Palestinian movement from the Kasaba area directed to the Tomb of the Patriarchs. Movement is segregated for incoming and outgoing movement. Palestinians exiting Kasaba are processed through a combination of turnstiles, allowing one person at a time to pass, and a metal detector. The process is slow and problematic during Friday prayers.
<b>Abu Rish, H2</b> <i>Near the Abu Rish Mosque at the end of Al Shohada St.</i>	Manned by the IDF. The only access point for international organisations into Hebron Old City. Palestinians have to go through a mobile metal detector.
<b>Ar Ramadin</b> <i>At the entrance to Ar Ramadin village from Road 325</i>	Manned by the Israeli Border Police. All Palestinians with a Ramadeen address are allowed to cross after an ID check. The checkpoint also restricts the movement of Palestinians and Arab Israelis on Road 325. <b>Throughout the week</b> , the Israeli Border Police manning Ar Ramadin checkpoint delayed workers for long periods of time since the ID check process was slow.
<b>Halhul – Sa'ir, Partial CP</b> <i>At the entrance to Halhul (also called 'Nabi Younis' CP)</i>	Located on the junction between the two towns on Road 60. Monitored from the nearby observation tower.
<b>Al Fawwar, Partial CP</b> <i>Al Fawwar-Dura junction</i>	On Road 60. Monitored from the nearby observation tower.
<b>Tarqumiya – Idhna, Partial CP</b>	On Road 35. Manned on a temporary basis by the Israeli Border Police.
<b>Ras Al Joura, Partial CP</b>	Near the junction between Road 35 and Road 60. Manned on a temporary basis by the IDF.

**Gaza Crossings/Chekpoints****Erez crossing**

Erez was open all week for Palestinian traders as well as the movement of diplomats, international humanitarian workers, and critical medical cases with special coordination arrangements. However, since 4 July and for the first time since 12 June, a very limited number of senior Palestinian businessmen were permitted to cross Erez towards Israel and the West Bank. Appendix for daily log of movement is based on estimated figures due to the non-presence of staff at the Palestinian DCL at the present time:

- 15 August: 41 medical cases, 51 Palestinians with special coordination and 15 businessmen crossed.
- 16 August: 32 medical cases, 51 Palestinians with special coordination and 29 businessmen crossed.
- 17 - 18 August: 26 medical cases, 39 Palestinians with special coordination, and 23 businessmen crossed.
- 20 August: 59 medical cases, 53 Palestinians with special coordination and 53 businessmen crossed.

The crossing remains closed for Palestinian workers since 12 March 2006.

**Rafah Passenger Terminal**

Rafah crossing was closed all week. It was last open on 9 June.

**Commercial checkpoints:****Tulkarm/Qalqiliya****Taybeh**

An Israeli private company has the responsibility of controlling the checkpoint. The back-to-back system has been operational from 0800 to 1700 hours Sunday to Thursday and 0800 to 1200 hours on Fridays.

**Nablus****Awarta checkpoint**

*Main commercial checkpoint in Nablus since July 2003*

Open from 0600 to 1800 hours, Sunday to Thursday, Friday from 0600 to 1400 hours and closed on Saturday. Commercial trucks need permits to pass the checkpoint.

**Jenin****Al Jalama**

*Main commercial checkpoint*

Open between 0700 to 1600 hours Sunday to Thursday and 0700 to 1200 hours on Fridays.

**Ramallah/AI Bireh****Beituniya**

*Back-to-back checkpoint*

Officially open between 0700 to 1700 hours Sunday to Thursday, 0700 to 1300 hours on Fridays and closed Saturdays and Jewish holidays. Open for commercial goods and a back-to-back system is in operation. Only Palestinians holding Jerusalem IDs and driving Israeli yellow-plated trucks are allowed to pass through this checkpoint without using the back-to-back system, but only if bill lading stipulates Kafr 'Aqab and/or Sameeramees as offloading destinations. This checkpoint is not open for private cars or pedestrians. As of 1 July, UN staff and diplomats are not allowed to cross as it has become solely open for the movement of goods.

**Hebron****Tarquimiya**

Entrance for commercial goods (back-to-back), west of Hebron on Road 35 for both Hebron and Bethlehem governorates. The back-to-back section is open from 0700 to 1700 hours; goods are moving across smoothly and all cargo is checked by the IDF Military Police.

**Gaza Strip****Karni**

The conveyor belt operated for one day to transfer wheat into Gaza (21 August) due to shortages on the local market. Karni crossing has generally been closed since 12 June.

**Sufa**

Sufa crossing was open on five scheduled operating days this week (15, 16, 19, 20 and 21) for the crossing of commercial commodities and humanitarian aid. On 17 and 18 August, it was closed (weekend).

**Kerem Shalom**

Kerem Shalom was open on five days for the crossing of commercial goods and humanitarian aid provided by international aid organizations. On 17 and 18 August, it was closed.

**Nahal Oz Energy Pipelines**

Nahal Oz energy pipelines were open on five scheduled operating days. On 17 August, they were closed for Israeli security reasons and On 18 August they were closed for the weekend.

**Method and Sources**

The information used to compile these Briefing Notes comes from a range of sources with a field presence in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip. The accuracy of the reported information is ensured through the corroboration of reports by two additional sources. Typically, the OCHA Field Coordination Unit (FCU) receives an initial incident report from a source, which is verified through visits to the incident site in addition to further corroboration with a third source, such as an NGO. In addition, OCHA FCU collects military orders as documentary evidence and provides information on incidents witnessed in person.

In the interests of timeliness and readability, the sources are not listed for each incident within the texts of the report. Listed below are the sources relied upon each week in compiling this Briefing:
