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## SUMMARY STATEMENT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL OF MATTERS OF WHICH THE SECURITY COUNCIL IS SEIZED AND ON THE STAGE REACHED IN THEIR CONSIDERATION

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General wishes to submit the following statement on matters of which the Security Council is seized and on the stage reached in their consideration on 13 December 1958.

- 1. The Iranian question (see S/4098).
- 2. Special agreements under article 43 and the organization of the armed forces made available to the Security Council (see S/4098).
- 3. Rules of procedure of the Security Council (see S/4098).
- 4. Statute and rules of procedure of the Military Staff Committee (see S/4098).
- 5. The general regulation and reduction of armaments and information on the armed forces of the United Nations (see S/4098).
- 6. Appointment of a governor for the Free Territory of Trieste (see S/4098).
- 7. The Egyptian question (see S/4098).
- 8. The Indonesian question (see S/4098).
- 9. Voting procedure in the Security Council (see S/4098).
- 10. Reports on the strategic Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands pursuant to the resolution of the Security Council of 7 March 1959 (see S/4098).

## 11. Applications for membership (see S/4098)

At its 842nd meeting, on 9 December 1958, the Security Council included in its agenda the following sub-items relating to this question:

- "(a) Letter dated 3 December 1958 from Mr. Diallo Telli, Ambassador of the Republic of Guines, addressed to the Secretary-General (S/4122).
- "(b) Resolution 1144 A (XII) of the General Assembly, adopted on 25 October 1957; letter dated 8 December 1958 from the representative of the United States of America addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/4127).

"(c) Resolution 1144 B (XII) of the General Assembly, adopted on 25 October 1957; letter dated 8 December 1958 from the representative of the United States of America addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/4128)".

Sub-item (a) was included in the agenda without objection and sub-items (b) and (c) were included by 9 votes to 1 (USSR), with 1 abstention (Iraq).

Following discussion, the Security Council proceeded to vote on a draft resolution (S/4131) of Iraq and Japan concerning point (a) of the agenda, which provided that the Security Council, having examined the application of the Republic of Guinea for membership in the United Nations, should recommend to the General Assembly that the Republic of Guinea be admitted to membership. The draft resolution was adopted by 10 votes to none, with 1 abstention (France). (For text of adopted resolution, see document A/4133.)

The Council then began consideration of sub-item (b) of the agenda, and continued consideration of sub-items (b) and (c) at the 843rd meeting, also held on 9 December. A joint draft resolution (A/4129/Rev.1) was submitted by France, Japan, the United Kingdom and the United States, providing that the Security Council, inter alia noting the Assembly's reaffirmation at its twelfth session that the Republic of Korea is fully qualified for admission to membership in the United Nations and should be admitted, should recommend to the General Assembly that the Republic of Korea be admitted to membership.

An amendment (5/4132) was submitted by the USSR, providing for deletion of the first paragraph of the preamble of the joint draft resolution (5/4129/Rev.1) and for insertion in the operative paragraph of the words "the Democratic People's Republic of Korea and" before the words "the Republic of Korea" and the word "simultaneously" after the words "be admitted".

The USSR amendment received 1 vote in favour (USSR) to 8 against, with 2 abstentions (Iraq and Sweden), and was not adopted. The joint draft resolution received 9 votes in favour to 1 against (USSR), with 1 abstention (Iraq), and was not adopted owing to the negative vote of a permanent member of the Council.

In connexion with sub-item (c) a joint draft resolution (S/4130/Rev.1) was submitted by France, Japan, the United Kingdom and the United States, providing that the Security Council, <u>inter alia</u> noting the Assembly's reaffirmation at its twelfth session that Viet-Nam is fully qualified for admission to membership in the

United Nations and should be admitted, should recommend to the General Assembly that Viet-Nam be admitted to membership. This draft resolution received 8 votes in favour to 1 against (USSR), with 2 abstentions (Canada and Iraq), and was not adopted owing to the negative vote of a permanent member of the Council.

The Council agreed, under rule 60 of the provisional rules of procedure to submit a special report to the General Assembly concerning the applications which it had not recommended.

## 12. The Palestine question (see S/4098)

At its 841st meeting, on 8 December 1958, the Security Council decided without objection to include in its agenda as a sub-item under this heading a letter (S/4123) dated 4 December 1958 from the permanent representative of Israel addressed to the President of the Security Council, concerning an incident of 3 December between Israel and Syria in the Hula area. The Council had before it a report (S/4124) from the Chief of Staff of the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization in Palestine relating to that incident.

After having invited the representatives of Israel and the United Arab Republic to participate, without vote, in the consideration of this question, the Council began its deliberations on the matter with statements by the representatives of Israel and the United Arab Republic.
